Annual Session Unsuccessful.

It seems that some over loyal subjects to the State Treasury are advocating annual sessions of the legislature. According to the present law the law-making bodies of the State meet every two years. These biennial sessions are a great annoyance to the taxpayers of the state and most of the people of Pennsylvania wish the legislature could meet only every ten years.

Most of the legislation is class legislation and is more injurious to the man than the absence of such a law would be to a few. It takes a smart lawyer to keep up to the laws passed at the biennial sessions of the legislature and we dare say that not many of the members and Senators themselves understand half of the legislation they grind out in a log-rolling session of five or six months' duration.

The scheme to inaugurate annual sessions of the legislature is nurtured and concocted only in the minds of those who are anxious to rob the State Treasury and to deplete the pockets of honest taxpayers in every part of the Commonwealth. There is no necessity for annual sessions of the legislature. Biennial sessions come too often. If there is to be any change in the frequency of the sessions of the legislature, then give us a two months' session every ten years and put every member and every Senator under a penalty of life imprisonment who votes for a "deal."

If we had any assurance that we would get good, honest legislation, an annual session might be of value to the people of the Commonwealth, but that is so improbable that we oppose, in most strenuous terms, the inauguration of annual sessions of our state legislature. Give us the proper legislation when you can and we will have more faith in annual sessions. Then and not till then will we agree to such a change. The yoke of tyranny is already too heavy and the burdens of taxation and robbery are already drawing out the life and ambition of honest toil. The introduction of annual sessions would be a detriment to the many and a benefit to only a few.

County Fair Again.

Last year an effort was on foot to establish a county fair, but the movement was started too late to accomplish the desired result. Besides, no direct and concentrated effort was made to enhance this branch of agricultural industry.

The plan now proposed is to buy the land necessary for the holding of the fair, mortgage the land and use the money (\$100,000) appropriated by law from the county Treasury to pay the interest on the mortgage. It will be understood that the Association shall be conducted for the benefit of our agricultural interests and not with a view of paying the principal of the debt.

It should be possible to raise \$2000, or \$2500, for the purpose of erecting buildings, stables, fences and making improvements. Shares can be sold at, say \$20, each and

each shareholder be given an annual admission ticket for himself and family. This reduces the price of a family admission ticket to \$1.20 or the interest on the money invested in his share of stock. There are, of course, persons who are willing to buy more than one share. One man has pledged himself to sell \$500 worth of shares. We need only five such men.

Under this plan the receipts for admission and ground rents can be devoted to the payment of expenses and premiums. If there is a surplus it might be put in an emergency fund or devoted to payment on the mortgage.

There seems to be a real desire to revive the Snyder county fair and a meeting will be called in a few days where all interested can present themselves and give views and in a liberal way give their encouragement to the project.

The Silver Question.

The silver question is discussed in Germany on somewhat the same lines as in this country, and is regarded as a very live question. The following opinion on the feasibility of bi-metalism is that of Dr. Otto Arendt, translated by President E. B. Andrews, of Brown University, and printed in full in the February Review of Reviews:

"No great revolution in prices therefore follows the restitution of silver to its old role. That is the second specter with which men seek to horrify public opinion. However, suppose it should come, and the value of gold should sink by half, exactly as the Silesian Times maintains. It does not follow that the farmer is no better off, because all prices, including those of his produce, rise. Every farmer will gladly pay for wages and for everything he buys, twice as much as he now pays, provided all the forms of his income double. He would gladly see the change if only his fixed expenses, like mortgage interest, quitances, taxes, and burdens, were not doubled. Besides in farming, what a man produces for his own use counts for much more than in other callings. This may be remarked in a purely theoretical way. In practice no such wide-reaching effect of bimetalism could be considered. It would not alter the value of money to any such extent as that. It would, mainly by doing away with the different ranges of value in different parts of the world, introduce an upward tendency in prices, as the sole gold standard brought a downward tendency. Instead of the slow increase in the value of money now going on there would be either complete steadfastness, or a slow lessening in the value of money. Differences in ranges of prices would disappear, as also monetary crises, Commerce and business would be quickened and in a short time nothing would seem so incomprehensible as that the world allowed itself for a quarter century to be halted in its economic development by a sorry experiment with the sole gold standard."
