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## FOR PRESIDENT, William McKinley COINAGE CATHECHISM.

### Some Pertinent Questions and Answers on the Money Problem.

### WORLD'S GOLD PRODUCTION

Many Millions of It Comes Freely  
Into Circulation.

### REGARDING TREASURY RESERVE.

Germany, France and England All Occupy  
the Same Position as the United States  
in This Respect—Suspension of Gold  
Payment on Government Notes Would  
Affect Every Person That Possessed a  
Dollar.

Q. Where are the latest official figures  
of the world's gold production? A. In the  
mint director's estimate for 1900, published  
last week.

Q. What does this estimate show the  
world's present annual gold production to  
be? A. \$230,000,000, or \$17,000,000 more  
than in 1895.

Q. Compare this total with previous  
periods. A. The world's average annual  
production of gold, between 1870 and 1880,  
was \$115,081,500 of silver, \$61,857,500;  
total, \$205,939,000, or less by \$13,000,000 than  
this year's estimated production of gold  
alone. As lately as 1884, the world's com-  
bined production of gold and silver was  
less by \$13,000,000 than the present  
production of gold alone.

Q. Does this \$230,000,000 of new gold  
come freely into circulation? A. It does.

Q. How can you prove that fact? A. By  
the annual coinage statements of the lead-  
ing gold producing and gold importing  
nations, all of which show a steady in-  
crease. By the amount of gold in the  
world's great depository banks, which has  
increased with equal rapidity. These are  
perfectly trustworthy signs.

Q. Is it not true that most of the new  
supply is "cornered" by the Rothschilds?  
A. There is not the slightest reason for  
supposing such a thing.

Q. But if the world's gold supply has  
been increasing so rapidly, and is not  
"cornered," why has it grown harder every  
year for our government to maintain its  
own gold reserve? A. Because of the free  
silver coinage movement in this country.

Q. How can that movement affect our  
gold reserve? A. First, by forcing so much  
new silver and paper money into circula-  
tion that nobody pays gold any longer to  
the government. Second, by the threat  
that the free coinage party will redeem  
the government notes and bonds in silver only,  
which causes holders of the notes to present  
them now for gold.

Q. Why should such holders present  
their government notes for redemption  
now? A. For the same reason that made  
people, in the old state bank days, rush in  
for redemption of the notes of a bank  
which was likely to stop payment.

Q. Are there not other nations than our  
own whose currency requires a large gold  
reserve? A. There are.

Q. What nations, for instance? A. Ger-  
many, France, England.

Q. Do not these countries have the same  
trouble with their gold reserve as our  
treasury does? A. Not in the least. The  
gold reserve in each of these three coun-  
tries is larger than necessary, and is con-  
stantly increasing.

Q. Why is their situation so different  
from ours? A. Because there has been no  
doubt of the money standard in Germany,  
France or England.

Q. But has not the United States always  
had especial trouble in getting gold for its  
currency? A. It has not.

Q. When did it get gold easily? A. Be-  
tween 1834, when the gold standard was  
adopted, and 1861, when paper money was  
substituted and the gold standard aban-  
doned.

Q. Did gold flow in readily at any other  
period? A. It did.

Q. When? A. After the resumption of  
specie payments by the United States in  
1870, which was accepted by the world as  
our re-adoption of the gold standard.

Q. What followed that resumption of  
specie payments? A. Within two years,  
\$174,000,000 gold was sent to us from Europe.

Q. But surely this gold did not go into  
the treasury? A. More of it than the  
treasury needed went in.

Q. How do you know that? A. As  
early as Sept. 19, 1870, the secretary of the  
treasury announced that "gold coin, be-  
yond the needs of the government, had  
accumulated in the treasury," and au-  
thorized the use of gold in regular trans-

expenditures.

Q. Were those two years a period of  
prosperity? A. For this country, a period  
of unparalleled prosperity.

Q. How long did this prosperity last?  
A. Until the silver coinage movement was  
gained threatening our maintenance of the  
old standard.

Q. What happened then? A. Gold pay-  
ments into the treasury almost ceased,  
and gold withdrawals through redemp-  
tion of government notes grew larger.

Q. Suppose all the gold in the treasury  
were to be used up, what would hap-  
pen? A. The government could not  
pay gold coin to the holders of its notes.

Q. What difference would that make to  
holder of a government note—say of a  
dollar bill—who did not care to use gold?  
A. His dollar bill would depreciate along  
with all other government notes. Since it  
no longer could exchange for a dollar in  
gold, it would no longer buy what a dollar  
gold would buy.

Q. How would such depreciation show  
itself? A. By an artificial and general rise  
in prices, without a rise in wages and  
salaries.

Q. Has this ever actually happened? A.  
During our civil war, when the gold  
standard was abandoned, the government  
paper money depreciated to 50 per cent. of  
its gold value, the gold premium rose  
above 100, and there was a frightful ad-  
vance in prices.

Q. Then would suspension of gold pay-  
ment on government notes injure all hold-  
ers of such notes? A. Sooner or later, it  
would cheat every man with a dollar bill  
in his pocket.—New York Evening Post.

### Opposed to Public Morality.

The platform is objectionable not for the  
silver plank alone. Almost every feature  
of it is equally objectionable on grounds  
both of common sense and public morali-  
ty. The clause in reference to the issue  
of bonds in time of peace is both absurd  
and immoral. The demand that the power  
to issue notes be taken from the national  
banks is vicious in the last degree. The  
tariff talk is sound enough, but sound  
tariff talk will not counterbalance the rank  
anarchy of the concluding sections, which  
practically amount to confiscation of the  
railways and licensing of mob violence.  
The opposition to life tenure in the public  
service—one of Grover Cleveland's great  
boons to the country—is a step backward  
to the corrupting and debasing spoils sys-  
tem which has so depraved our politics.  
Altogether, and from his platform the  
people may learn what to expect if they  
support him at the polls.—Jersey City News.

### It Will Be Heated.

Free silver has won in Chicago; will it  
win at the election in November? We do  
not think so. It would be disastrous to  
the country if it should win. It will not  
win if organization and work can prevent it.  
The solid south and the solid west could  
win, but the south will not be solid on  
such an issue and the west is not yet  
hopelessly insane. Kentucky will not vote  
for a free silver president on a free silver  
platform, nor Maryland, nor Delaware.  
The Richmond Times, one of the truest  
Democratic newspapers in the south, says  
that "if the Democratic party adopts free  
silver as its platform Virginia will go for  
the Republicans, provided there be no  
fraud in the elections." With a free ballot  
and a fair contest we believe that Ala-  
bama and Tennessee and Florida cannot  
be held in the free silver column.—Charleston  
(N. C.) News and Courier.

### "Sops to Anarchy."

The platform advocates the mad spirit  
of free and unlimited coinage of silver,  
tricked out with demagogic appeals to  
class and sectional hatred, and sops to an-  
archy and the rankest socialism. The candi-  
date is fully in accord with all this. He  
thoroughly represents all that is repre-  
hensible and to be condemned in the pleas  
for national dishonor, financial disaster  
and party disgrace that built up the Chi-  
cago platform.—N. Y. Irish-American.

### Union Is Necessary.

There is no reason to doubt the final  
defeat of the Chicago nominee, but it can  
only be brought about by the consolida-  
tion of all the sound money forces, regard-  
less of party lines. The Democratic plat-  
form is brutal in its blindness; it means a  
scaling of all debts and the impairment of  
all credits. It means a lowering of the  
national reputation and a confession of the  
failure of our boasted system of educa-  
tion.—Providence Journal.
