**Beaver Loses His Suit.**  
 We clip the following from the Lewisburg News court proceedings:  
 "Wm. H. Beaver, trustee for Sarah J. Beaver, vs. George M. Slear. The defendant, George M. Slear, in 1876 gave to his wife a note at one day for a sum of money. Mrs. Slear died in 1893 and as it was of ten customary for a husband when he borrowed money from his wife, to give a note to a trustee of his wife, who would serve merely as a figure-head. After Mrs. Slear died this trustee, who is a relative, proceeded to collect this note with interest on it from 1876 to the death of Mrs. Slear in 1893. The defendant, Slear, did not object to payment of the principal, but did object to payment of interest. The contention of the defendant is that where a wife loans money to a husband that she is not entitled to interest as she is one of the family and lives out of the proceeds of the husband's earnings or income, unless there is a specified contract that she is to receive interest. The plaintiff held that the general rule of law is that notes draw interest from maturity, and as this note matured after one day it would draw interest and that the note itself was a contract. The defendant held that this would be so as a general rule, but that between husband and wife there was no contract to pay interest unless the note said so particularly, or unless it could be proven by witnesses to the satisfaction of the jury. Three more witnesses who testified that the understanding between Slear and his wife was that the note was to draw interest, and then three more witnesses who testified directly the opposite. The case went to the jury who unraveled the knotty testimony and returned a verdict in favor of the defendant, Geo. M. Slear.

**BUCKNELL OPENS.**  
 The opening of Bucknell University this year was the most auspicious in the institution's history. Up to Thursday night seventy-six new names were enrolled in the college alone. The enrollment in the other departments is not yet complete as students are still coming in.

The foot ball team went into training on the afternoon of the opening day under coach Mr. Wm. Young, of Cornell. About eighteen candidates presented themselves for the preliminaries. After light practice and a talk on foot ball by the coach, the executive board went into session and selected seven of the old men to go to the training house, which this year will be at Mendenhall's, on South Fourth street. It is expected that several players from some of the normal and preparatory schools will make valuable acquisitions to the team. The only hard place to fill at present is the position of quarter-back. There are, however, four or five candidates trying for this position. The place of tackle left vacant by Devall will, in all probability, be filled by Hantzberger, a graduate and an ex-foot ball player of the Shippensburg Normal school.

The season opened with a game on the University campus, Sept. 26th, with Wyoming Seminary. The second game will be played on Franklin field, Philadelphia, with the University of Pennsylvania.
