The meeting then adjourned.

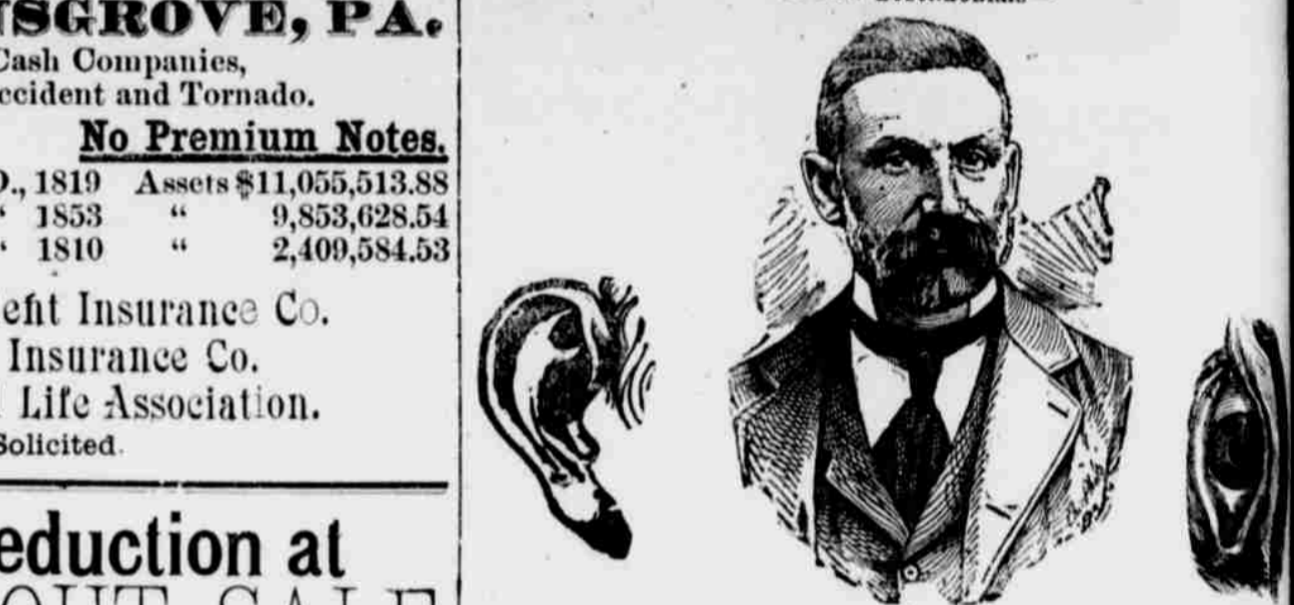
