The Harrisburg Telegraph says: There was a man in the city the other evening who said he would like to wake two bets, and would place them with anybody at even money. He offered to bet that McKinley's majority in Pennsylvania will be larger than the combined majorities of all the states that are carried by Bryan. Nobody took the bet. Then he offered to bet that the majority for McKinley in the electoral college would be larger than the entire electoral vote cast for Bryan. There were no takers to this proposition. State Treasurer Haywood has made a bet of a hat with Chief of the Bureau of Industrial Statistics Clark that McKinley will have 600,000 plurality in Pennsylvania, and to show his confidence in Republicanism, he has made another bet of a hat with Mr. Clark that McKinley will have 150,000 plurality in Ohio. Eating Slowly.

The opinion that hurry in eating is a prolific cause of dyspepsia is founded on common observation. The ill results of bolting food have been attributed to the lack of thorough mastication and to the incomplete action of the saliva upon the food. Two-thirds of the food which we eat is starch, and starch cannot be utilized in the system as food, until it has been converted into sugar, and this change is principally effected by the saliva. But there is a third reason why rapidity of eating interferes with digestion. The presence of the salivary secretion in the stomach acts as a stimulus to the secretion of the gastric juice. In respect of the mechanical function of the teeth, food which goes into the stomach incompletely mangled with saliva passes slowly and imperfectly through the process of stomach digestion. Therefore, as a sanitary maxim of no mean value, teach the children to eat slowly, and in giving this instruction by example, the teacher, as well as the pupil, may receive benefit.—*Troy Times.*
