The remedy of the embarassed has been to call things by other names, and to pretend that we do not exchange commodities against anything we choose to call money. But this operation would no sooner be over than we should have to begin again. There would be more leases and mortgages and contracts under the new money, and they would speedily become too hard to bear, and we should have to invent new names for other money in order to make them lighter. debtor class.-N.
