NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN.
"That every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold an office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States or of this State, or any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive, or judiciary department of this state or of the United States, or of any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or any officer of such election shall be eligible to be then voted for.

The Inspectors and Judge of the elections shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district to which they respectively belong, before seven o'clock in the morning, and each of these Inspectors shall appoint one clerk who shall be qualified voter of such district.

TO YOUNG VOTERS.

A fervent Appeal to their Patriotism and Common Sense.

AN ERROR OF JUDGMENT

Might Really be the Source of Regret Throughout Life.

THE RESPONSIBILITY OF VOTERS.

Young Men Casting Their First Ballot Will Perform a Duty to Their Country by Voting for McKinley and Sound Money—The Pages of History Prove That Cheap Money Means Cheap People and a Cheap Country.

There is every reason to predict that the great contest for the preservation of public credit has already been won, as the evidence of the demoralization and collapse of the silver movement accumulates on all sides. This appeal to young voters is made, therefore, less for the cause of sound money than for their own sake. An error of judgment upon assuming the responsibilities of citizenship may be the source of regret throughout life.

The Philadelphia Record speaking of this says: "Many a man lived to deplore the want of reflection and the inexperience that betrayed him into the Know Nothing party. When too late, he learned that such a secret political organization, in its spirit as well as in its aims, was hostile to the tolerant genius of American institutions. He was not long in discovering that the leaders who secretly controlled the movement of the party were mostly men who had failed in political life and were in the employment of little public consideration. Before the organization had dissolved he had discovered that its members, himself among the rest, were objects of political distrust; for men do not readily forgive others for the same errors which they commit themselves. More than one public man could be named who in later life found difficulty in recovering entirely from the reproach of Know Nothingism."

"Later, when the civil war arose, many indolent youths in the north, as well as men of mature years who should have known better, did not make much effort to conceal their want of sympathy for the cause of the Union. Much of this was due to the spirit of party, and much, doubtless, to a genuine abhorrence of war and slaughter. But from a position of neutrality many of these men gradually drifted into active sympathy with secession, and some of them into acts closely bordered upon treason. The sinister epithet of "copperhead" clung to them for years after the close of the civil war, and marked a political offense which very seriously interfered with their social and political usefulness.

These are among the most striking examples of the evil personal consequences of political offenses in this country. History has been defined as philosophy teaching by example; and those nations and individuals that have the best memories make the fewest political mistakes. But, in spite of the lessons of experience which the world has been garnering for 600 years, a party in this country is contending for the mastery in order to try a monetary experiment which the voice of history has pronounced disastrous. It is for the purpose of warning your voters among "The Record's" readers against connection with such a party that this world is spoken. Young men most frequently err from want of experience, and old men from forgetting the teachings of
