Curious Uses of Balloons.

Probably there never was a time when so many inventors and scientists were trying to solve the question of aerial navigation as at present. Flying through the air seems to possess a most powerful charm for many people, and the tragic death of one experimenter serves only to attract the attention of a score of other adventurous spirits in the same direction.

At this time it may it may be interesting to know something of the numerous uses suggested for balloons, aside from that of conveying passengers through the air from place to place. Ballcons have long been used for conveying rocket sigmais or fireworks into the upper regious for purposes of entertaining crowds of people, or conveying information or orders in times of war; they have also been used to convey deheate self-registering ther-mometers and barometers far up into the air to investigate its temperature and destiny. Aside from these uses, however, it has been suggested that they be employed for a great many other purpose

All of the schemes mentioned below have been patented by the government in due form. So let the reader beware of infringement!

A great many patents have been granted for the use of balloons in connection with elevated railrods, in which the weight of the cars is wholly supported by clongated balloons. Beneath the cars are trolley wires to convey the electric current to motors carried by the cars in order to propel the apparatus. In all of these cases there is a permanent connection between the trolly and balloon. A patent has also been granted for the use of balloons to hold anchored in the air high up above the earth a rope or cable down which ears are to run by gravity, the direction and speed of the curney depending upon the com parative elevations of the various balloons of the series,

One of the oddest uses of the balloon, howeveyer, yet suggested, has been to employ it to overcome Colorado droughts. In 1890 a pat-ent was granted to a citizen of that State for a rain-making apparatus that is always to be relied upon. A bulloon long enough to extend across a field has suspended beneath it a perforated pape; connected with the ends of this pipe are sections of hose which extend to the ground and are attached to powerful force pumps. The operation is simplicity itself. All you have to do is to ele-vate your pipe, guy the balloon, and force the water up to a point where it will do the most good.

It has also been suggested to use balloons to convey life preservers to ships, and in the Art Gallery of the tent Office can be seen pictures of balloous sent from a lee shore stoutly making their way in the teeth of the wind in their efforts to convey succor to the unfortunate tempesttossed mariner.

In 1853 there was granted a patent in England on a scheme for preventing seasickness by attaching balloons to a platform holding sus-ceptible passengers; the theory being that it could be kept from rock-

Patents have also been granted for raising sunken vessels by lowering balloons to the hold of the ships and then inflating them until the ships came to the surface.

Every one of the above mentioned schemes have been patented in this country excepting that to prevent sea sickness.
