A movement is now being agitated by residents of Columbia county to have the government place monuments in honor of Forts Augusta and MacIntosh. The first fort was built by order of and consent of the royal commissioner, English, in 1756. Governor Morris, of Pennsylvania Province, consented to and commissioned William Clapman, an English officer, to build the place. Captain Gordon, the engineer officer who built the magazine and afterwards commanded the fort, was an English officer. Fort MacIntosh was built by General Irvine and Continental troops serving under General Dan Broadhead. Governor Hastings, Congressman Kulp and numerous other prominent men of the State are heartily in favor of the laudable movement and it will, no doubt, be successful.
