

TO STOP POT-HUNTING.

Representative Focht's Bill Creates a
Sensation Among Sportsmen.

Representative Focht, of Union
County, on Feb. 10th, introduced in
to the Pennsylvania Legislature, a
bill that should have the endorse-
ment and approval of every sports-
man in the State. If you are favor-
able to the provisions of the bill we
hope you will request your Senator
and Member to vote for it, and also
call the attention of your local press
to the measure. We believe the
number of birds killed is paramount
to the time in which the killing shall
be done. A season entirely satisfac-
tory to the extreme Southern por-
tions of the State, the Central and
Northern section can never be fixed.
This point must always be a com-
promise. But it is possible to save
our game from the hand of the cold-
storage expert, and leave the field
open for the business man and boys
who hunt for recreation.

Referring to the bill introduced
by Mr. Focht, the Lewisburg *Satur-
day News*, of Feb. 13th, in a letter
from Harrisburg, says:

"A game bill introduced this week
is a hummer, and has already creat-
ed a sensation among the sportsmen
of the State. It is modeled after
the New York State law and is de-
signed to knock-out the pot hunter
and expert bird exterminator who
shoots to slaughter, and to give the
average country gunner a chance to
see a feather once in a while when
out hunting in the spirit of the true
sportsman, which is for recreation.
The bill provides that no person
shall offer for sale any quail, pheas-
ant or wood-cock, under a penalty
of five dollars for each bird. No
restaurant keeper or dealer in mer-
chandise shall employ anyone to cap-
ture or kill any of the birds above
mentioned under a penalty of twenty-
five dollars for each and every
bird purchased. Transportation
companies are not allowed to re-
ceive or transport any birds after
same have been killed under a pen-
alty of twenty-five dollars. The
person making the information and
procuring a conviction shall be en-
titled to one-half of the fine, the
other half to go to the game com-
missioners of propagating game
birds. Every bird killed or trans-
ported shall be considered a separ-
ate offense. No person shall be pre-
vented from killing any such birds
in the lawful season for the use of
himself or his family, nor the carry-
ing by such person into railroad
trains or common carrier, not more
than twelve wood-cock at one time,
and not more than twelve pheasants
at any one time. The act does not
prohibit the carrying of birds killed
in other states by transportation
companies. Where the pot hunter
and game butcher gets it in the neck
is here: It shall be unlawful to kill
in any one day more than five pheas-
ants nor more than eight wood-cock
by any one person, under a penalty
of five dollars for each bird killed.
If we can get this bill through the
fellow who hunts for the market for
profit, and is hired by the cold stor-
age trusts to go into the rural dis-
tricts on tours of extermination,
will be out of a job, and a few birds
will be left for the rural boys and
gunners who hunt for sport as much
as to secure game."

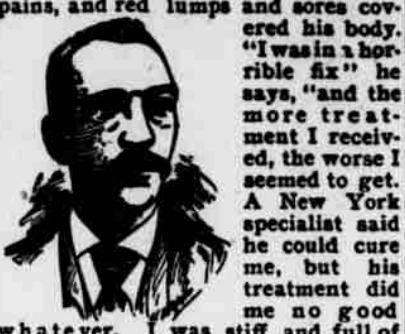

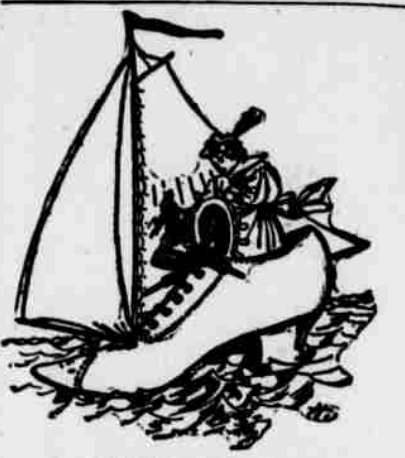
