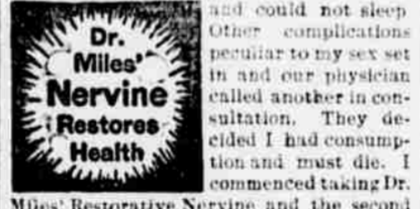
Elysburg Boy Killed.
