**INDEPENDENT CANDIDATE
For State Treasurer of Pennsylvania.**

WILLIAM B. THOMPSON, the banker, is a man whose name is a household word in Western Pennsylvania. He was born in 1846 in Allegheny City, Pa. He is a self-made man, and a typical American in every respect. Educated in the public schools of his native city and studying hard in the evenings at home he finally passed the examination for entrance to Washington and Jefferson College. He was obliged to abandon his aspirations for a collegiate course, and between the years 1861 and 1864 he enlisted three times in the Union army and was twice wounded by his parents on account of his youth. The end of the war found him a member of Knapp's Battery, Pennsylvania Volunteers, and he is an active member of Post No. 254, A. K.

At the close of the war he obtained a position in the Mechanics Bank of Pittsburgh, where he served for fourteen years, when he was elected President of the bank. He is now the senior member of the banking firm of W. B. Thompson & Co., of Pittsburgh.

Mr. Thompson has always been an active citizen and during his career has been identified with many charitable and public enterprises which have been instituted in behalf of his fellowman. After the great Johnstown flood he acted as treasurer of the Relief Fund and personally supervised the payment of a vast sum of money to the sufferers and in the work of relief. He was treasurer of the Russian and Armenian famine funds and of the World's Relief Fund which was raised in the dark days of the winters of 1893 and 1894. He is treasurer of the Municipal League and the Humane Society. He is a trustee of Washington Jefferson College, of the Western Theological Seminary, and of the Avery Memorial Fund for the colored race. He is a director in the Pittsburgh Safe Deposit Company. He is a member of the Third Presbyterian Church, and has always been a Republican in politics, but being of an independent mind, he has not hesitated to criticize wrong doing in his own party.

The shameful action of the last State Legislature in breaking up the Republican party pledges for much needed reforms in the State has caused intense indignation all over the State, and in Pittsburgh, on September 11, 1897, within a stone throw of the spot where the Republican party was organized, the Independent Party of Pennsylvania was brought into being for the express purpose of correcting the evils existing in State government, and to afford the honest, independent voter an opportunity to vote on State and local issues without having his hands tied by the machine leaders of either of the old parties.

Wm. B. Thompson, the candidate for State Treasurer, is the first candidate of the new party, and with the same manly courage and independence which have marked his whole life, he has accepted and entered earnestly into the canvass for the office. Fitted particularly for the duties of State Treasurer by his training, and with a record for integrity and uprightiness that has endeared him to all who know him, he stands to-day before the people of Pennsylvania as a model candidate, and it has been truly said by the Pittsburgh press, that it will be the people of the State, and not Wm. B. Thompson, who will be the gainer by his election.

The independent people of the State should remember this when they go to the polls on November 2, 1897, and vote to free the State Treasurer from suspicion, by placing a man in charge whose life work and record puts him above suspicion.
