

Washington, Nov. 23.-Elizabeth L. Smiley commenced proceedings here yesterday for a limited divorce from Charles W. Smiley. They were mar-ried in this city in 1890. Mrs. Smiley alleges that they are first cousins, declares that some time previous to their marriage her husband "inoculated her with ideas not in accordance with modern civilization, and such was the influence the defendant gained over her. that she saw things only in the light in which he presented them to her. rarely exercising her own judgment. so much so that she would put in writing requests to him to do many things utterly at variance with common sense. and admissions as to her conduct," and that he even made her believe it was a favor to take sums of her money and invest it in his name.
