she is distinctively English. She is
the daughter of Paul, king of the
Maori; and is the most beautiful
dusky woman that ever lived. In
her own country—New Zealand—the
aborigines come miles to get a
glimpse of her face, and visitors to
Australia are urged to take in New
Zealand that they may behold Ton-
omaroanu.

The princess is not only beautiful,
but she is lovely in disposition and
very rich. The Maori kingdom is a
large one, and the system of tributes
is very exacting. The princess is
