STATE POLITICS.

Interesting Facts Concerning a Bunch of Bogus Reformers.

THE BUSINESS MEN'S LEAGUE

Its Futile Attempt to Fool the People of the State.

A NEWSPAPER IN A GREAT BAGE.

The Organ of the Fake Organization Tears Passion Into Tatters in a Frantic and Abusive Editorial Condemning President McKinley For Not Appointing Federal Officials Chosen by This Preposterous Concern.

(Special Correspondence.) Philadelphia, Jan. 24.—That curious fungus on the body politic, the Business Men's League, is busily engaged in arranging to defeat the nominations of the Republican party at the next state election without regard to the personnel of that ticket.

The gentlemen connected with the Wanamaker-Doian organization being all wealthy men and as a rule men who have made their fortunes because of measures which originated and were carried through by the Republican party-notably the tariff laws-are shining examples of the truth of the statement that "satan still finds mischief for idle hands to do." They are filling such newspapers as they can command with lamentations and slanders. They are declaring in wholesale terms that the Republican leaders in Pennsylvania and the Republican organization have neither character nor intelligence, that they are wholly ignorant of the desires of the people of Pennsylvania, and are animated solely with the desire to injure and betray them. Such practical political results as they have been able to carry out to the extent of submission to the people have invariably been annihilated at the ballot box. The press agents and salaried mud slingers of this organization continue to be Mr. Frank Willing Leach, the Van Valkenburg brothers, and some of the minor agents of the old hog combine. In order to earn the liberal salaries paid to these gentlemen under the contracts made a year ago they are running the Business Men's League scandal bureau on double time. In this they are assisted by one of the Philadelphia morning papers, which seems to exist wholly to carry out the wishes of these amateur political assassins.

The league is just now loud in the declaration that another Delamater campaign is about to be undertaken by the Republican party. All of these gentlemen neglect to state that they demanded the nomination of Delamater in public calls and letters, and threatened to bolt if he was not placed at the head of the Republican ticket. The avow that their purpose is to overthrow bossism, and yet they meet in secret and seek to make nominations for United States senators, governor and other state officials, with a boldness and impudence that no so called "boss" would dream of.

These men and their associates have for years been connected with every plot to plunder the people of Philadelplot to plunder the people of the plant of the plunder the people of t way grabs, electric light grabs, and every other scheme by which the citicitizens could be plundered.

Their purses have grown fat with the results of these raids upon the rights of the citizens, and yet they are not content. They are plotting alliance with the Democrats; they are preparing for independent tickets; they are slandering every man whose record warrants him in seeking a nomination at the hands of the Republican party for prominent state offices-all for their own selfish purposes. They will not agree to lend their aid to the selection or election of men who have unimpeachable public records, and who carry county after county by popular vote at the primaries. They take the position that unless the men whom they select and whom they expect to control in office are placed in nomination they will take their little tin dishes and go home and make things very disagreeable for everybody within range of their voices. If there be any discontent in the ranks of the Republican party in the state at this time it has been created and has been fomented solely by this league of business men, which has been repudiated by every respectable and responsible element of the party from the president and his cabinet down to the representatives of the Republican organizations in the wards and districts in which these men reside.

If the Republicans desire to create and perpetuate a Wanamaker-Dolan-Leach-Van Valkenburg dynasty they have not shown it in the past when the issue was an open and direct one at the polls, and we believe that when their eyes are opened and they see the real purpose of these stuffed phophets of Pennsylvania politics they will treat them with the contempt they have always shown them before. It is but fair to infer that these gentlemen, baving grown rich on the plunder of Philadelphia city, are now turning covetous eyes upon the whole state of Pennsylvania, and desire the fatness thereof.

This annex to the Martin machine in Philadelphia is just now consumed with rage over its failure to control any of the federal appointments in the rity or state. The truth of the matter is that President McKinley is fully aware of the selfish motives that control these men who pose as critics and reformers. He has repeatedly snubbed them, and it looks as if this fact was finally penetrating their thick skins. The best evidence of this is shown by a frantic article, abusive of President McKinley, that appeared in the columns of the Philadelphia Evening Telegraph on Friday, Jan. 21. The Telegraph is published by the son-inlaw of John Wanamaker, and besides being the personal organ of the disappinted senatorial aspirant is also the public organ of the bogus Business Men's asseciation. The editorial, head-



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ed "The President's Surrender," says, among other things:

"Two important appointments in which this city is especially interested were practically disposed of by the president yesterday. They were the collectorship of the port of Philadelphia and the vacancy in the interstate commerce commission. A delegation from the Business Men's League, of Philadelphia, called upon Mr. McKinley to urge the appointment of Major E. A. Hancock as t. e successor of Collector Read. The delegation was made up of men whose business pursuits bring them into close and constant contact with the collector, and who are necessarily familiar with the duties of the position and with the qualifications that are required for their efficient discharge. They were also, one and all, good and true Republicans, devoted to the interests of the party as well as to the interests of the business community, and thus had every reason and every inducement to advise and urge the appointment of a man who is fully qualified for the office. But their peal to Mr. McKinley in behalf of Major Hancock appears to have made no impression upon the president. Senator Quay was ahead of them; he had a conference with the executive just before the business men were shown into his presence, and the rejection of Major Hancock was, therefore, a foregone conclusion. Months ago the man from Beaver had promised the collectorship of the port of Philadelphia to State Senator C. Wesley Thomas, and to Mr. Thomas, as the president intimated in his talk with the business men yesterday, the collectorship will go. It is Mr. Quay who makes the appointment, and not the president of the United States, the provisions of the constitution thereof to the contrary notwithstanding."

Just what the Wanamaker-Dolan-Leach - Blankenburg - Van Valkenburg combination expects to gain by abuse of the chief executive of the nation is difficut to understand. Outside of this the only other thing of interest in the outburst is the candid acknowledgment of Quay's influence at the White House. T. M. A. --


