Fire Near Kratzerville.

On Wednesday morning the barn with all its contents, near Kratzerville, on the Martin Maurer farm was burned to the ground, at about 5 30 a. m. Mr. Maurer was up early and started away with his team, his wife turned out the cows and every thing was alright, and in a short time after the barn was in flames, how the fire started is a mystery. The only cause thus far determined on, is that tramps lodged in the barn and by the use of matches fired the barn as a box of matches was found only a short distance from the barn, probably the tramps were using matches in the barn and the straw or hay was set afire in this way, and was burning a slow flame while Mr. Maurer was yet at home, but as farmers generally have their feed all prepared for the morning Mr. Maurer did not go to the upper floor of the barn and did not discover the fire, this is supposed the cause, but the fact how the fire originated is not known. However it is a heavy loss to Mr. Maurer and we sympathize with him.—*New Berlin News.*
