as Told in the Reports of the Victorious Commanders.

SOMMODORE SCHLEX'S MODESTY.

We Congratulates Sampson on Victory, Declaring It "Big Enough For All of Us," and Extols the Valor of the Men on the Different Vessels.

Washington, July 27.-The reports of Admiral Sampson, Commodore Schley and the commanders of the vessels of the North Atlantic squadron were given to the press last night. That of Admiral Sampson is addressed to the secretary of the navy, while the others are addressed to Admiral Sampson, as commander of the fleet.

The report of Admiral Sampson tells of the order in which the ships of his equadron were ranged and of the disevery of the Spanish vessels steaming from the harbor, explaining that at the time he was on his flagship seven miles from the harbor entrance, en route for conference with General Shafter. Referring to the discovery of Cervera's fleet, he proceeds:

"The men of our ships in front of the port were at Sunday "quarters for inspection." The signal was made simulaneously from several boats, "Enemy's ships escaping." and general quarters was sounded. The men cheered as they sprang to their guns, and fire was was opened probably within eight min-

utes by the vessels whose guns commanded the entrance. The New York marned about and steamed for the es-caping fleet, flying the signal "Close in wards harbor entrance and attack wassels," and gradually increasing speed until toward the end of the chase she was making 16½ knots, and was rapidly closing on the Cristobal Colon. She was not at any time within the range of the heavy Spanish ships, and Ber only part in the firing was to resoive the undivided fire from the forts in passing the harbor entrance and to are a few shots at one of the destroyers, thought at the moment to be at-

He then proceeds at length to describe the work of the different vessels in his fleet, having this to say of the Gloucester:

tempting to escape from the Glouces

"The skillful handling and gallant fighting of the Gloucester excited the admiration of everyone who witnessed it, and merits the commendation of the navy department. She is a fast and antirely unprotected auxiliary. vesselthe yacht Corsair-and has a good battery of light rapid fire guns. She was lying about two miles from the harbor entrance, to the southward and eastward, and immediately steamed in, opening fire upon the large ships. An-ticipating the appearance of the Pluton and Furor, the Gloucester was slowed, thereby gaining more rapidly a high pressure of steam, and when the destroyers came out she steamed for them at full speed, and was able to close at short range, where her fire was accurate, deadly and of great volame. During this fight the Gloucester was under the fire of the Socapa bat-tery. Within 20 minutes from the time they emerged from Santiago harbor the careers of the Furor and the Pluton were ended, and two-thirds of their people killed."

After describing the destruction of the Marir Teresa, the Almirante Oquendo and the Vizcaya he has this to say of the rescue of the crews from the sinking vessels:

The rescue of prisoners, including the wounded from the burning Spanish ssels, was the occasion of some of the most daring and gallant conduct of the duy. The ships were burning fore and aft, their guns and reserve ammunition were exploding, and it was not known at what moment the fire would reach the main magazines. In addition to this, a heavy surf was running just inside of the Spanish ships. But nothing deterred our officers and men until their work of humanity was complete."

The report details with rigid exactness the work of the different commanders, speaking of the "admirable fudgment" of Captain Chadwick, of the New York, in pushing the sinking Cristobal Colon toward shore to prevent her sinking in deep water, and of the surrender of the Cristobal Colon to the Brooklyn. The only direct reference to Commodore Schley is as follows:

"Commodore Schley, whose chief of staff had gone on board to receive the surrender, had directed that all their personal effects should be retained by the officers. This order I did not mod-

Commodore Schley, after reporting the work of the different vessels, ap plauds the work of many officers on the various ships, naming each one, and

"I have never in my life served with a Braver, better of worthier crew than that of the Brooklyn. During the combat, lasting from 9:35 until 1:15 p. m., much of the time under fire, they never flagged for a moment, and were ap-parently undisturbed by the storm of projectiles passing ahead, astern and over the ship.

The casualties on board this ship were: G. H. Ellis, chief yeoman, killed; J. Burns, fireman, first class, severely wounded. The ship was struck about 25 times.

"I congratulate you most sincerly upon this great victory to the squadron under your command, and I am tribute in the least to a victory that seems big enough for all of us."

Captain Evans, of the Texas, has this say of the work of the men of his ship in the battle;

"The officers and men of this ship behaved admirably. No lot of men could have done more gallant service.

"I cannot express my admiration for my magnificent crew. So long as the enemy showed his flag they fought like Americans, but when the flag came down they were as gentle and tender as American women.

Captain Clark, of the Oregon, appends a list of all the officers of his vessel, "hoping that it may be of service to them should the claims of others for advancement above them ever be con-

The reports of Captain Chadwick, of the New York; Captain Taylor, of the Indiana; Captain Philip, of the Texas. and Lieutenant Commander Wain-wright, of the Gloucester, are also in-cluded in Admiral Sampson's report.
