Events of National Interest at Omaha in October - Excursions Are All Westbound.

TO THE CITIZENS OF PENNSYL-1898, as Pennsylvania Day.

The citizen: of Nebraska who claim Pennsylvania as their native state have organized a Pennsylvania Club in the city of Omaha. This club vanians residing in Nebraska.

The Pennsylvania Club members send greeting to their fellows in the Keystone State, and ask them to attend the Exposition on the 5th of October; the day following, the Club will hold in the city park a grand basket picnic for all Pennsylvanians who may wish to participate. Many prominent citizens have signified their intention to attend, and orators of national reputation will deliver addresses. We are assured that Governor Hastings and his staff will be present at that time.

The Exposition is well worthy of a visit. It surpasses all other Expositions except the World's Fair, and in some of its features is even more beautiful. It is filled with wonderful exhibits of the plains and mountains and the Trans-Mississippi country. During the week of October 5th, in addition to the other attractions, there will be a show of live stock, gathered from all parts of the United States, which in variety and importance cannot be excelled. There will be an assemblage of over one thousand Indians gathered from the tribes of the west, who will participate in war dances, sham battles, sports and contests of physicial endurance. Their native villages have been transplanted upon the Exposition ground.

During that week, the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben will hold their Grand Mardi-Gras festival, On Tuesday night they will give their annual parade of over forty floats, said to surpass anything of the kind ever attempted. Thursday night, the wonderful electric street procession can be seen, and Friday night the ball presided over by the King and Queen of the Ak-Sar-Bens will be patronized by the society people of western cities.


