THE WAR WITH SPAIN.

Our war with Spain is far reaching in its effects upon our national character. Its reaction upon ourselves in healing sectional animosity and fostering feelings of patriotism is perhaps the most important result accomplished. Who would have thought ten or eleven years ago the ex-Confederate Gen. Fitzhugh Lee would before the close of the century find the chief glory in being called a "Yankee," or that ex-Confederate General Wheeler would be heralded to the world as one of the most patriotic and beloved leaders of our national army in the field?

No event has occurred since the beginning of our national existence to inspire patriotic feelings as the war just closing. The spirit of the end of the nineteenth century with its contest with medievalism has been so triumphant as to stir the whole world. In our own land flag makers have been driven as never before to keep up with the orders, and toy stores have been raided throughout the country by enthusiastic small boys in quest of drums, wooden guns and soldier hats. The small boys, however, have only reflected the feelings of their parents, as never before has there been such an interest taken in the Sons of the Revolution and other patriotic societies. As evidence of this awakening, go to the Pension Office at Washington and see the immense number of letters received daily by parties in search of information as to their ancestors. Here in many instances the searcher finds the only clue in existence to evidence which shall prove his right to membership in one of the great societies of descendants of Colonial or Revolutionary ancestors. Marriage certificates, records of sickness and discharge papers filed eighty years ago by applicants for pensions by those who actually fought under Washington are now resurrected by the great grandchildren of the applicants, and assume an interest and value never dreamed of by those who filed them.

Here also can be found complete outlines of the history of each man's service with the names of officers under whom he served, the battles in which he fought, and dates of enlistment and discharge, all attested by the pensioner in person and supported by affidavits of parties who knew the truth of the facts. Incidentally it may be noticed that in going through the building to the room in which the searcher is permitted to look over the files of Revolutionary pensions, a large number of new file wrappers are seen. These attract attention because across each are broad red, white and blue stripes. If you pick up one of these files you notice that it contains an application for pension on account of the Spanish-American war of 1898. Here again is a hint at the prevailing spirit of the times.
