PENSION CHECKS.
Postmasters Are Authorized to Cash
the Same.
It has been decided by the post-
office department to permit postmas-
ters to cash pension checks and remit
such checks to the respective de-
positories in lieu of the correspond-
ing amount of cash. The pensioner
presenting the check must be known
personally to the postmaster. It is
not expected that the checks will be
presented to postmasters at the large
places where there are banks, this ar-
rangement being intended merely to
add to the convenience of the sol-
diers and to enable them to avoid the
expense which now frequently at-
taches to the negotiation of their
checks. It is believed that through
the method some millions of dollars
will be paid the pensioners through
the money order system of the de-
partment, and without any expense
whatever.
