Levi Luck, who resides near Troxelville, was hit by the accidental discharge from a gon in the hands of William H. Ewing, a well-known citizen and farmer of Spring twp, on Tuesday of last week. The entire discharge was ledged in Mr. Luck's body on the left side of his andomen, from the effects of which he died and was buried on Sunday from his late home. It was one of the saddest funerals held in that seetion for some time.

Mr. Ewing had been out hunting wild ducks and was on his way home through a field in which Mr. Luck was husking corn. The hunter was carrying his game across the barrel of his gen.
