Gilbert, Earl Winey, Misses Lillian Stetler, Rose Schoch, Libbie and Gertrude Dunkelberger of this place started for their final autumnal ride. The wind was very strong and by the time they arrived at Kreamer, Misses Rose Schoch and Gertrude Dunkelberger found themselves unable to cope with the wind. Death of Aaron Walter. Aaron Walter, eldest son of Delrick and Rebecca Walter, and a brother to Joseph Walter, deceased, John W. Walter of Franklin township and Mrs. John Stahlacker of Middleburg was born in Franklin township, Snyder county, Pa., March 6, 1830. He was married to Judith Bowersox, a sister to Amnon Bowersox of Beavertown. In the fall of 1853, with coat and wagon, he moved to Bellevue, Ohio, where he engaged in farming. He was very successful and became the owner of valuable real estate. In 1860 the Angel of Death visited the family, leaving the husband and five children to mourn the loss of a kind mother and an affectionate wife. Mr. Walter, with his children, came to Middleburg and lived with his mother for two years. In 1868 he was married to the widow of Daniel Moyer (nee Hannah King). After their marriage he returned to the Buckeye state where he has lived ever since. This union was blessed with two children. On Nov. 1, 1887 a dark cloud again overshadowed this home and the second wife was taken to the World Eternal. Thus bereft, he came to Middleburg in July last, to seek consolation with his brother and sister and relatives. While visiting with his nephew, K. C. Walter, in the morning of Aug. 25, he was stricken with paralysis, totally disabling his left arm and leg. After an illness of five weeks and no signs of improvement, accompanied by his children, who had come to wait on him, and sister, on a car chartered for the occasion, he was safely taken to his home, where continuation of illness of five weeks followed. Death came to his relief on the 3rd inst., aged 68 years, 7 months and 27 days. Mr. Walter was a consistent member of the Reformed church of Bellevue, Ohio. Sale of Carriages, Traps, Etc. A FATAL SHOT.

Levi Luck Dies from the Effects of the Accidental Discharge from Wm. Ewing's Gun.

Levi Luck, who resides near Troxelville, was hit by the accidental discharge from a gun in the hands of William H. Ewing, a well-known citizen and farmer of Spring township on Tuesday of last week. The entire discharge was lodged in Mr. Luck's body on the left side of his abdomen, from the effects of which he died and was buried on Sunday from his late home. It was one of the saddest funerals held in that section for some time. Mr. Ewing had been out hunting wild ducks and was on his way home through a field in which Mr. Luck was husking corn. The hunter was carrying his game across the barrel of his gun. While in the act of showing his game to Mr. Luck, the gun was discharged with the result as above stated. Drs. A. M. and C. G. Smith and J. O. Wagner were summoned and Mr. Luck was removed to his home where pieces of clothing, the wad and only a few shot were removed.

Death of Aaron Walter.

The victim was the son of the Samuel Luck of Salem, this county, was 26 years of age and was married to the youngest daughter of George Oldt. The widow and two small children survive. The ancestors of Mr. Luck were among the earliest settlers of this county and played a prominent part in the development of this section of the state.

Henry Schoch Dead.

Henry Schoch, late of Selinsgrove, died at his home on Water Street, Wednesday of last week. He leaves a widow and three daughters—Laura, married to Rev. J. C. Shindel, chaplain of the 11th Ohio Regiment, which had been at Santiago; Verdie, married to Ross Travers, who has a daughter, Walter Street, Huntingdon County, and father who resides at home. Deceased is a son of Jacob Schoch born Feb. 18, 1801, died Jan. 17, 1883 and his wife Catherine Miller. They were the parents of 8 children, William; Matilda; Henry—the deceased; George J., who resides in Monroe township; Elizabeth; Susan; Maria, the wife of Dr. B. F. Wagenseller of Selinsgrove and John, who resides at Hummel's Wharf, this county. The funeral took place Monday from his late home. Deceased was 80 years of age.
