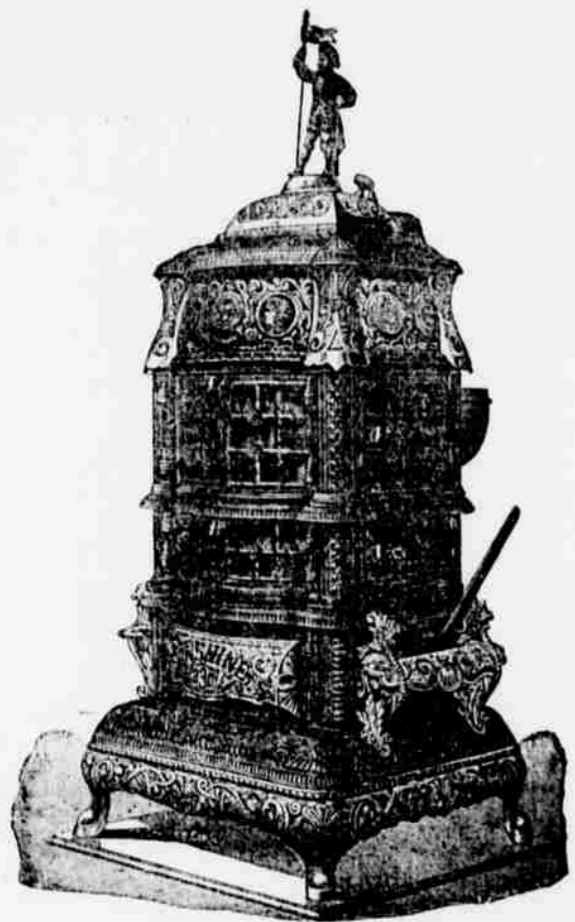

Big Wheat Harvest.

The soil of Pennsylvania will produce more wheat to the acre than any other state in the Union save Washington. This has been proven by figures just completed by the Department of Agriculture. Dr. J. Bullivant of Spokane, Assistant Dairy Commissioner of the State of Washington, was in Pittsburg Monday on his way to Washington, armed with figures for the Government department. Dr. Bullivant said: "The showing made by Pennsylvania this year in the production of wheat per acre has been a surprise to wheat growers. The Keystone state has always been very good in wheat, but the men who deal in figures went over them many times this fall before they proved beyond doubt that Pennsylvania was the second state in the Union in the production of wheat to the acre.

"The State of Washington leads the country in production to the acre. Our figures are 23 1/2 bushels to the acre, while Pennsylvania comes along with 19 bushels to the acre. The production of the other States per acre to crop are as follows: Oregon, 17; Ohio, 16.9; Michigan, 15.6; Kansas, 15.5; Nebraska, 14.5; Minnesota, 13; Indiana, 13; North Dakota, 10; South Dakota, 8.
