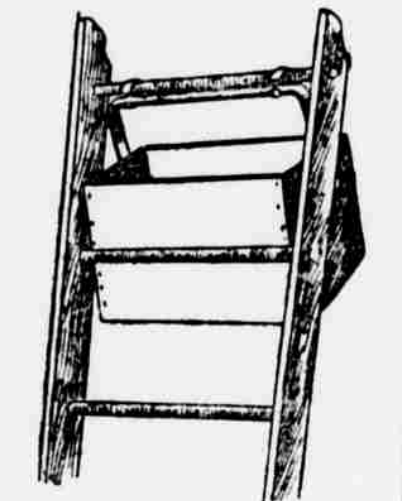

FRUIT GATHERING BOX.

A Contrivance Which is Far Superior to the Basket Now in General Use.

The ordinary basket is not a convenient receptacle into which to pick fruit from a ladder. Too little of the opening is presented between the rounds, owing to the round form of

the basket's top. The round form also keeps the basket from being stable, as it is constantly swinging about on the one hook supporting it. A fruit-gathering box is shown in the cut which obviates both of these defects. Its handle is made from a flat hoop soaked in water and bent into the proper shape. This handle can be supported by two hooks, keeping the box very firm. With a box the full opening from one side to the other is afforded for putting in fruit. If the box is carefully lined with a double thickness of burlap there will be less likelihood of bruising the fruit, even in the smallest degree. - N. Y. Tribune.

ART AND ARTISTS.

Two portraits by Rembrandt have just been added to the British national gallery.

The British museum has bought a collection of the drawings of the late George Du Maurier. The drawings include the originals of many of Du Maurier's best known society cartoons.

The remarkable statement is now going about that since Meissonier's death his pictures are rapidly depreciating in value, and only the most moderate prices are being realized for those pictures still in the hands of his widow.

The Rembrandt society of Holland, which held its yearly meeting lately at Amsterdam, reports an expenditure of 30,925 florins during the year upon the purchase of paintings which would otherwise have gone into the collections of foreign purchasers and been lost to the Dutch nation.

Nearly all the recently deceased English artists have left good-sized fortunes. Edward Armitage was worth \$1,592,310; Sir John Gilbert, \$1,157,920; Sir John E. Millais, \$485,995; Sir Edward Burne-Jones, \$207,465; J. L. Pearson, \$239,739; Lord Leighton, \$239,190; W. C. T. Dobson, \$85,540; Stacy Marks, \$40,940; and Philip H. Calderon, \$30,515.
