Electric Power For the Elevated Roads

New York, Feb. 7.-Definite announcement is made that the Manhat-Elevated Railway company has devided to install electricity as the motive power for the entire system and to issue \$18,000,000 of aditional stock to meet this extraordinary expenditure. George J. Gould, president of the Manhattan company, dictated the following statement: "The most careful and conservative estimates made by experts show a saving of two and onehaif cents per mile on the entire can nifeage on the elevated roads. As we are now running over 40,000,000 car miles per year, the saving in oper uting expenses alone will be over \$1,-000,000 annually."

Death of Prince Alfred of Saxe-Coburg Meran, Austria, Feb. 7 .- Prince Alfred of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha is dead. He had been suffering from chronic cerebral trouble. Prince Alfred was the son of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, second son of Queen Vic toria, and was born at Buckingham palace, London, on Oct. 15, 1874. He was a captain of Prussian infantry. and unmarried. He was the only son and heir.

NewYorkLegislature Opposes Roberts Albany, Feb. 7 .- In the assembly last night the resolution urging the unseath r of Congressman-elect Roberts. of Uta. because of his identification with polygamy, was adopted by a un-- mous vote.

Church Riot in Buffalo.

Buffalo, N. Y., Feb. 7.-A squad of police were called out yesterday to protect Father Martinelli, priest at the Italian Church of St. Anthony of Padua, from the violence of several hundred men and women. Between 3,000 and 4,000 members of the church are italians and about 600 are Sicilians.
