TO MARK OLD AUGUSTA.

Last week Senator Hummel of Selinsgrove introduced a bill in the Senate appropriating \$8000.00 for the purchase by the State of a part of the site of Old Fort Augusta at Sunbury. This place is replete with ancient historical occurrences and during the early settlement of this country was the scene of many a conflict between the whites and red skins. During the colonial period, the place was known as Shamokin and was the home of that renowned and beloved Indian chief, Shikellimy, for many years. This was also a place of rendezvous for travelers who as a rule followed the river. It was here also that Conrad Weiser spent a great deal of time. An Indian burying ground has been recently discovered on this very tract and the place is worthy of the attention of the great State of Pennsylvania. The history of this place is perhaps best and most fully described and narrated by John F. Meginnis, the historian of the West Branch valley.

The present movement to buy the site of Fort Augusta was started by the Daughters of the Revolution. We trust Senator Hummel's efforts to get a bill through carrying with it the provisions above recited, will be crowned with success.

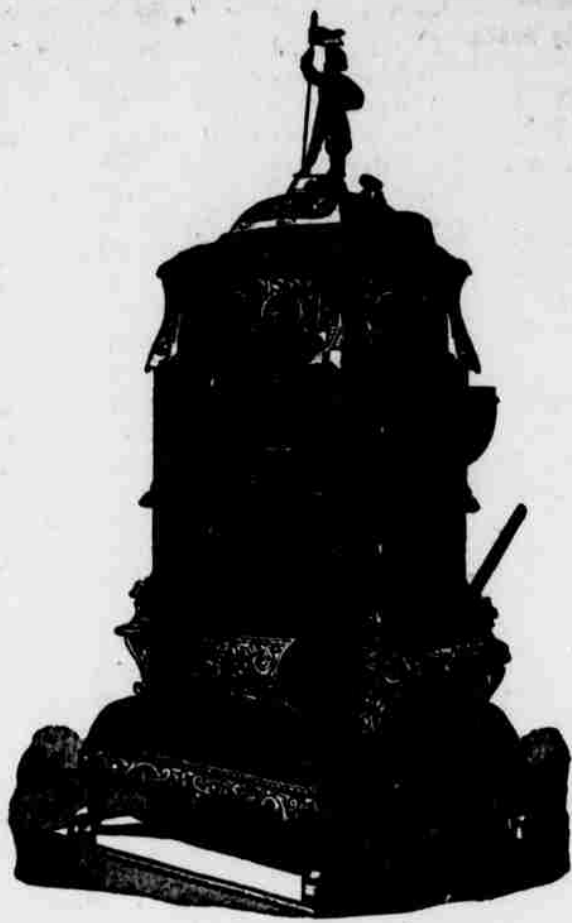
