QUAY STILL AN ISSUE.

The acquittal of U. S. Senator Quay and his immediate appointment of Governor Stone to the position which the Legislature refused to give him leaves the question still an issue before the people. Governor Stone proposes to force upon the people a man whom they have distinctly refused to elect or accept. It is still a question, notwithstanding his appointment, whether the United States Senate will accept the Governor's appointment. Even if they do Quay will only hold the position until the Legislature will again convene to elect some one else.

The act of the Governor in making this appointment is an usurpation of power not delegated to him. If the Governor thinks he can take the bull by the horns in this manner, he may see the day when the people of the state will be only too glad for an opportunity to persuade him otherwise. The Governor very well knew that the people did not desire Quay's restoration to his seat in the Senate or else their representatives would have re-elected him.

The people are more thoroughly aroused than ever and they will be more enthusiastic in their endeavors to eradicate bossism from the cardinal principles of the duties of a United States Senator.

Only six of the hold over Senators are Quay men while the majority of the House has been opposed to Quay's re-election. Many of the representatives who have been arrayed with Quay have done so against the expressed wish of their constituents. It is easily foreseen that Quay will never be elected U. S. Senator again.

Notice is hereby given to the citizens and qualified voters of the Borough of Middleburg, Pa. that in pursuance of an ordinance or resolution of the Board of School Directors at a meeting held upon the 12th day of April, 1899, an election will be held in the Court House in the Borough of Middleburg, Snyder Co., Pa., (being the place of holding the general and borough elections in said Borough) on TUESDAY the 23rd day of MAY A. D. 1899, between the hours of 7 A. M. and 7 P. M. of said day, for the purpose of obtaining the assent of the qualified electors of said Borough of Middleburg to an increase of indebtedness (or increase of debt) of said Borough to amount greater than 2 and less than 7 per centum of the last preceding assessed valuation of its taxable property said increase of indebtedness to be held by the officers of and under the same regulations as provided by law for the holding of municipal elections. The tickets to be voted at said election and received by the election officers are to be either written or printed, and are to be labeled on the outside "Increase of Debt," and containing on the inside the words, "No Increase of Debt," or the words "Debt may be increased for the purpose of paying for the new public school building to the amount of Six Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00). Agreedly to the several Acts of Assembly in such case made and provided.

STATEMENT.
The amount of the last assessed valuation of taxable property of the said Borough of Middleburg, (for school purposes), less exempt property, is \$148,090. There is no existing debt, except that proposed to be incurred. The amount of the proposed increase (or increase of debt) is the sum of \$6,500.00, which is 4.25 per cent of the assessed valuation. The purpose for which said debt is to be increased (or incurred) is to raise funds to the amount above stated to be used and expended in and about the erection and construction of a new public school building, now under contract and building in said Borough, for the use of the public schools of the said school district of Middleburg, and for the payment of the ground of site on which same is to be erected, and the apparatus for heating and ventilating the same, by issuing bonds to the amount of \$6,500.00, bearing not more than 4 per cent. interest, and maturing in not less than 10, nor more than 15 years.
