DR. P. A. BOYER DEAD.

Dr. P. A. Boyer, a most successful physician of Selinsgrove and a member of the State Board of Health, died at his home in Selinsgrove on Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock at the age of 43 years. He was born at Richfield, Juniata County, Oct. 24, 1856, a son of Henry S. Boyer and his grandfather was Francis A. Boyer. His mother is Amelia Boyer, a daughter of George Glass. Dr. Boyer was educated at Missionary Institute, now Susquehanna University, Shippensburg State Normal School and the University of Pennsylvania from which institution he graduated March 15, 1881. He located at Selinsgrove and became the successor of Dr. J. W. Sheets, his preceptor. Last summer, he was appointed by Governor Hastings a member of the State Board of Health. Nov. 30, 1882, he was married to Flora Carey, a daughter of A.M. Carey of Selinsgrove, to which union there were born a daughter, Sallie, and a son, Paul. The cause of the death was consumption. Dr. Boyer has always been an upright citizen, a faithful physician and a Christian gentleman.

FRESHMEN AT SUSQUEHANNA.
