FORESTRY WORK BY THE U. S.

The offer to give advice and furnish working plans to persons desirous to plant forest trees, made last August by the Division of Forestry, has received immediate response from farmers in every part of the country. Although but a few months have elapsed since the offer became generally known, one hundred and eighteen applications have been received, and plans for thirty-eight of these will be completed before the time for spring planting to begin. And still larger number have asked for written advice, which does not require field inspection by the forest officials. The treeless States have been quickest to avail themselves of assistance, the number of applications being as follows: Kansas, 38; Oklahoma, 19; Nebraska, 12; North Dakota, 9; Iowa, 6; Indiana, 5; Texas, 5; Minnesota, 4; Colorado, 3; Washington, 3; South Dakota, 2; California, 2; Illinois, 2; New York, 2; Ohio, 1; Missouri, 1; Delaware, 1.

The majority of plans are for tracts of five or ten acres, intended for prairie farmers to afford wind-breaks and fuel supplies. A few plantings of 1, 20 and 25 acres are being made as experiments in raising forest crops for market in regions where such material is scarce. After considering these applications in order, the Division of Forestry has sent experts to study the condition of as many as possible of localities which offered the best opportunities for object lessons to the public. Plans will be sent without delay to each owner, instructing him in detail how to plant, and recommending the species best adapted to his tract.

THE KENTUCKY BATTLE.

There are some vital facts which are undisputed in the Kentucky trouble, and some very serious complications which embarrass a peaceable adjustment of the conflict. There must, however, be a solution of the problem at an early day, and the only question is whether it shall be reached peaceably or whether it shall be crimsoned with the blood of a number of the belligerents.

The most vital of the facts, which are practically undisputed, is the very vital fact that Senator Goebel first passed a violently partisan election law by which the verdict of the people could be overturned by partisan tribunals, and after winning the nomination for Governor by fraud and employed his party machinery to the utmost to defraud his opponent in the contest, his own partisan tribunal was compelled to declare Taylor, the Republican candidate, elected Governor by some 2,500 majority. In other words, Goebel's own partisan tribunal, created by himself, after exhausting its power in the various counties of the State, was compelled to give the certificate of election to his Republican competitor.

Governor Taylor was thus inaugurated Governor on the regularly appointed day and in the regular manner in strict conformity with the law, and Senator Goebel immediately proceeded to contest that election, and he proceeded in conformity with the law that he had made for himself. No matter how bad the law may be, it is none the less the law of the State, and when the final tribunal charged with the trial of contested gubernatorial elections declared in favor of Goebel his title as Governor came to him clothed with every ceremony of law.

The fact is hardly disputed that Goebel was not elected Governor; but that he was deposed by many thousands upon a fair vote and honest return, but the law of the State makes him the Governor because the tribunal designated by the law to determine such a contest has given judgment in his favor. Taylor and his friends resist because they know that they have been defrauded, and Goebel's friends insist upon taking possession of the State offices because the law has declared that they are entitled to them.

The only question is whether there shall be submission to the judgment of the law that is regarded as unjust and the outgrowth of fraud, or whether there shall be revolution. Governor Taylor and his adherents are in the attitude of revolutionists, and their battle will henceforth be fought as such. They may precipitate anarchy and bloodshed, and it is possible for them to win by revolutionary action to overthrow a great public wrong, but the issue must be fought out peaceably or violently by the tribunals and the people of Kentucky themselves.

The national government cannot interpose to decide a disputed election for Governor in any State, and when the laws of a State have been exhausted and a final decision given in favor of any candidate, the national government cannot go behind that judgment and establish another government at the point of the bayonet. The only power that the President can be called upon to exercise is to interpose for the suppression of anarchy, and that can be done only when it is confessed that the authorities of the State are powerless to maintain the peace and protect the government in discharge of its proper official duties.

Considering the fearfully inflamed public sentiment of Kentucky, and especially the inflamed convictions of the mountain Republicans, who believe in fighting for justice, regardless of law, the problem presents the very gravest possible aspect. The death of Goebel cannot in any degree change existing conditions. It was originally Goebel's battle, but it is now the battle of his organization and his friends, and with a Democratic Lieutenant Governor to take his place, the struggle cannot be affected by the assassin accomplishing the death of Goebel. It is altogether the most serious of the several conflicts we have had in the past for the control of State governments, and while it is possible to reach a peaceful solution, it is probable that the disputants are just in the beginning of a violent and murderous conflict.
