ATTENDING THE WOUNDED.

Modern Provisions for Treatment of Sufferers on the Field of Battley

Never have the arrangements for dealing with the wounded been in so thoroughly satisfactory a condition as they are to-day, says the Church Family Newspaper. During an engagement, and as the troops advance, the wounded are sought out as quickly as may be possible, their wounds temily splinted and any other "first aid" given that may be necessary. Each soldier carries with him a small "first

aid" equipment in his tunic, so that he may bandage himself or temporarily arrest bleeding, or give such help to a wounded comrade. After "first aid" is rendered the wounded are borne on comfortable litters to the "dressing places." which are sheltered spots short distance behind the line of battle-usually in the rear of the artillery. Here they are examined by the surgeons; hemorrhage is securely arrested; bullets which can be easily and quickly removed are taken away; foreign bodies and splinters of bone or shell, if loose, are removed; limbs so secured as to render transport to the field hospital easy and comfortable, and anything else done which can be done with ease and rapidity. No big operation is done at these spots except in the case of limbs so shattered as to require immediate amputation. The surgeons at the "dressing places" do only what is absolutely necessary, and then the wounded are made comfortable in specially constructed ambulance wagons and transported to the field

RAILROADS BUILT IN 1899.

About 4,500 Miles of Track Laid in the Year-Best Record Since 1890.

The Railway Age has made a canvass of the country in regard to the building of new railroads during the past year, and finds that about 4,500 miles have been added in that fime. This is the greatest amount of new railroad that has been built in any one year since 1890, when 5,670 miles were completed. Scarcity of labor and the great increase in prices for rails and other supplies is believed to have had a material effect in keeping down the new mileage, and the coming year will without doubt see continuation of building.

Iowa stands at the head of the list of states in its figures for new mileage with 585 miles to its credit, although the previous ten years had seen little or no additions made to its railroads. A notable fact about the railroad building of the year is that there has been comparatively little building by new companies, while a number of the older roads have made important extensions. As examples, the Chicago & Northwestern has built 3571/2 miles; the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, 98 miles; the Northern Pacific, 95 miles in the United States and 29 miles in Canada; the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific, 82 miles; the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, 160 miles; the Illinois Central, 190 miles; the Burlington system, 80 miles; the Louisville & Nashville, 74 miles; the Seaboard Air Line, over 100 miles; the Great Northern, 74 miles, and the Choctaw, Oklahoma & Gulf, 162 miles. During 1899 Massachusetts had the lowest record of new trackage, the number of miles being only 4.20.



HOW TO CURE MEAT.

Something Which Everybody Thinks Knows, Sut Which Only a Few Do in the Right Way.

One important item in curing meat of all kinds is to lay it out in a cool place, where there is a good circulation of air, until the animal heat is thoroughly cooled out.

There is a process of sugar-curing pork that requires that the salt, sugar and spices be rubbed in while the ment is still warm, but it requires experience to do the work properly, and the average farmer can hardly afford to run the risk of failure.

Generally at this season there is little difficulty in thoroughly cooling out

meat if it is spread out over night. Meat should not be allowed to freed before it is salted, as it will not take salt while frozen. The salt is upt to form in cakes over the meat, and unless looked after when a few warm days come the meat will be certain to spoil. In applying the salt the best plan is to take a quantity in the hand and rub it on the meat.

This will cause the meat to take salt more readily than if it is simply sprinkled over it. After rubbing well lay the meat in the box or on the shelf arranged for it and sprinkle it liberally with sait. If the weather is moderate so that the meat is not frozen it is best to go over it a second time in a week or ten days, rubbing as at first, and then sprinkse again. If the weather is cold enough to keep the meat frozen this may be done in a few days after the wather moderates.

When meat is pickled instead of dry salted the brine should be made as strong as possible and should fully cover the meat. In three days the brine should be drawn off and either fresh brine put on or the old brine be boiled and the scum that rises to the surface skimmed off and then when cool poured back.

In both brine and dry salting the addition of some sugar, saltpeter and pepper will improve the quality of the neat as well as aiding in preserving it. Allowing the meat to remain in sait

too long has a tendency to make the lean part hard and unpalatable. Whenever sufficiently salted it should be hung up and smoked and then packed down. If this is done before the warm weather comes the risk of loss will be greatly lessened .- St. Louis Republic.
