The Post's remarks concerning the Indian Block house at Kreamer has brought out considerable discussion on the question of preserving that colonial relic. The Post has been cordially commended for the bold stand it has taken for the preservation of this land mark. All agree that something should be done. There is some dispute as to what this Block house should be called. That can easily be settled. Snyder County's Indian Forts' representative, Jay G. Weiser, called this trophy, "Hendricks' Block House." Exceptions have been taken to Mr. Weiser's name. The name is of small moment. If the Hendricks' erected it, it is properly named, if it was erected by the Schoch's, it should properly be called the "Schoch Block House." The name is of small moment now. What is most needed is preservation. If the Schoch's they will be going a great ways in establishing a claim to the name in the absence of proof as to who really erected the memorial.
