COLONEL LISCUM.

It was true Yankee blood that was spilled when Emerson H. Liscum, colonel of the Ninth Infantry, fell before the gates of Tien Tsin last Friday, for Liscum was a Vermont boy of the stock that fights for the sheer lust of combat. He has been a soldier since he was 20 years old, and saw service in the rebellion, the Spanish war, the Philippine war, and, last of all, in China. His country was not negligent of his worth and, when he died so gloriously the other day, it was preparing to honor him by promoting him to the rank of brigadier general in recognition of his bravery at San Juan.

Liscum was born on July 16, 1841, and began his military career May, 1861, when he entered the volunteer army as a corporal in the First Vermont Infantry. He was mustered out the following August and immediately entered the regular army as a private in the Twelfth Infantry.

Penny to Bridge Susquehanna.

An engineer corps of the Pennsylvania Railroad have completed the survey for a railroad bridge across the Susquehanna at Danville, and are running a line for a branch which will intersect with the S. H. & W. Railroad on the opposite side of the river, and pass through Danville, Bloomsburg and Berwick, where it will again be carried across the Susquehanna to intersect with the main line. Between Danville and Berwick the tow path of the Pennsylvania canal, now practically abandoned, will be utilized as a roadbed.
