

"Snyder County Marriages,-1835-1899" compiled by Geo. W. Wagenseller, A. M., contains a record of about 7500 marriages or 15000 names of Snyder county people. It consists first of a miscellaneous list of marriages compiled from the files of the Middleburg Post from 1868 to Oc-J F. Wagner is at work with three 1, 1885, when the marriage license law went into effect. Second, fro Oct. 1, 1885 to April 1899 taken from the license docket of Suvder county.
