**COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.**  
Bleeker was appointed foreman of the grand jury.

**COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.**  
The case of Edwin S. Walmer, et al., vs. N. J. Livingston was continued.

A subpoena in divorce was awarded in the case of Catherine L. Scheid, by her next friend, et al., vs. Charles W. Scheid.

In the case of G. C. Gutelius, now for use of W. H. Beaver, vs. Jacob Meyer, et al., leave was granted to enter judgment.

In the case of Albert E. Hunter, vs. Elijah Roush, a compulsory non-suit was entered and on motion of counsel for the plaintiff a rule was granted on the defendant to show cause why the same should not be stricken off.

In the case of John D. Houser vs. George Pontius, the verdict was in favor of the plaintiff for the sum of ten dollars.

In the case of Dr. J. E. Kanawell vs. J. H. Long and J. L. Hartman, administrators, et al., of Henry K. Sanders, deceased, the plaintiff accepted the tender of fifty dollars.

In the case of Harry E. Heintzelman vs. Kate Heintzelman, a divorce was granted.

In the case of E. C. Fiss, guardian of Ernest E. and Alice Heitrek vs. James A. Young and A. Ellen Stine, the verdict was in favor of the plaintiff for the land described in writ, and plaintiff's damages were assessed at \$425.

G. W. Bow, sheriff, acknowledged bond to Avilla Romig, for 119 acres of land in West Beaver township.

**ORPHANS' COURT.**  
Returns to orders of sale were confirmed in estate of Paul Walter, deceased; Charles Goodling, deceased; Henry J. Peters, deceased, and Isaac Saltzman deceased.

Writ of partition was awarded in estate of Samuel Fall, deceased.

Leave was granted the guardian of the minor children of Lewis Crawford, deceased, to loan money at five per cent.

Auditor's appointed in estate of Josiah Heffrich, deceased, was renewed to report to next term.

Auditor's report was confirmed in estate of Daniel Weaver, deceased.

All the accounts of administrators, executors, guardians and the widows appointments were confirmed as advertised, except those hereinafter mentioned.

**YIELDS TO JOINT DEMAND**

**China's Emperor Bows to the Will of the Powers.**

**HAS INSTRUCTED HIS ENVOYS.**

**While They Are Ordered to Agree to All the Demands, They Are Instructed to Make Better Terms if Possible—Li Hung Chang's Illness.**

Peking, Dec. 31.—Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang have communicated to the foreign envoys an imperial edict in which the emperor declares that China accepts the joint note and authorizes Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang to negotiate and to ask for a suspension of hostilities. Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang say that Emperor Kwang Su has expressed a desire that the court return to Peking at the end of February.

The Chinese themselves were greatly astonished at receiving the imperial instructions. Neither Li Hung Chang nor Prince Ching had expected success in persuading the court until ten days ago.

The emperor's instructions are to agree fully to the note, but to endeavor to get the best terms possible, particularly in the matter of limiting the number of the legation guards and also the places where these are to be located.

The plenipotentiaries are instructed to endeavor to limit the number of army posts along the line of railway to as few as possible, and finally to request the powers not to destroy the forts, but merely to disarm them.

Li Hung Chang's health is bad, and it is doubtful whether he will be able to do more than affix his signature to an instrument delegating his powers to Prince Ching until another plenipotentiary has been appointed. He was dressed yesterday and carried in a chair to the residence of Prince Ching, with whom he held a long consultation. Prince Ching then called upon the dozen of the diplomatic corps, the Spanish minister, Senor de Colona, and requested him to notify the other envoys, that instructions had been received from the emperor to sign the note.

The foreign communities in Peking are greatly satisfied at the decided tone of the edictive note and the assertion that the powers are determined to entertain no proposals for the modification of their demands. It is understood Li Hung Chang sent a memorial to the throne, couched in very strong terms, urging complete compliance.

The Germans killed 40 Chinese troops near Man Chong, northwest of Pao Ting Fu. They had no casualties. Among the natives a feeling of great mistrust is being caused apparently by the high handed action of the Germans, as the Chinese suspect them of an intention to force a serious engagement with the Chinese troops.

**To Protect Grave of Lincoln's Mother**  
Richmond, Ind., Dec. 31.—After many years of effort the grave of Nancy Hanks Lincoln, mother of Abraham Lincoln, is now the property of the state. Governor Mount has received the deed for the ground in the immediate vicinity of the grave in Spencer county in behalf of the Nancy Hanks Memorial association. The ground is to be turned into a park and a custodian will be put in charge and much beautifying done.

**General Gaselee Seriously Ill.**  
London, Jan. 1.—According to a special dispatch from Peking Gen. Sir Alfred Gaselee, commander of the British forces in China, is seriously ill.
