YIELDS TO JOINT DEMAND

HAS INSTRUCTED HIS ENVOYS.

All the Demands, They Are Instructed to Make Better Terms If Possible-Li Hung Chang's Illness.

Pekin, Dec. 31.-Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang have communicated to the foreign envoys an imperial edict in which the emperor declares that China accepts the joint note and authorizes Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang to negotiate and to ask for a suspension of hostilities. Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang say that Emperor Kwang Su has expressed a desire that the court return to Pekin at the end of February.

The Chinese themselves were greatly astonished at receiving the imperial instructions. Neither Li Hung Chang nor Prince Ching had expected success in persuading the court until ten days

To Protect Grave of Lincoln's Mother Richmond, Ind., Dec. 31.-After many years of effort the grave of Nancy Hanks Lincoln, mother of Abraham Lincoln, is now the property of the tate. Governor Mount has received the deed for the ground in the immediate vicinity of the grave in Spencer Memorial association. The ground is to be turned into a park and a custodian will be put in charge and much beautifying done.
