ENTOMBED AMID FIRE. Over Thirty Lives Probably Lost in a Burning Mine. EXPLOSION FOLLOWED THE FIRE. A Gang of More Than Twenty Men Who Went Down to the Rescue Have Probably Sacrificed Their Lives in the Attempt. Port Royal, Pa., June 11.—The Pittsburg Coal and Coke company's shaft No. 2 at this place is again on fire, after steady burning for seven years, and over 30 men in the mine, many of whom it is feared will never be heard from again. The names of those known to be entombed cannot be learned, but the following are known to be in the burning mine: Jock Peoples, married; Tony Stickle, married; Frank Davenport, married; John Daly, William McCune, superintendent of the district, home at West Newton; Dennis Wortley, pit boss of the mine; Michael Roy, a foreman of the Euclid mines, and about 30 other miners. About 6 o'clock smoke was seen to be issuing from shaft No. 2, which is on the line of the Pittsburg and Lake Erie railroad. It is thought the fire started from an explosion, and that six men were in the mine at the time of the explosion—Jock Peoples, Tony Stickle, Frank Davenport, John Duffy, Lawrence Ketter and John Stakes. Stakes and Setler were not near the place in which the explosion occurred, and on the arrival of a rescue party they were quickly brought to the surface, after being nearly overcome by afterdamp. They could give no information as to what had caused the fire and told the rescue party that four other men were entombed. About 7 o'clock Superintendent William McCune, of West Newton, general superintendent of this district; Dennis Wortley, pit boss of the mine; Michael Roy, foreman of the Euclid mines, and several other bosses, with about 20 men, went down shaft No. 1, which is just opposite, on the Baltimore and Ohio side of the river, and have not been heard from since. About three hours after the rescue party had been in the mine two more explosions were heard. Meantime the crowd around the opening of the shaft had increased, the crowd including many mothers, wives and sisters of the men entombed. All sorts of plans have been suggested for the rescue of the men. Some talk of turning the river into the mine, but many are opposed to this idea for fear of drowning the miners. All that would be necessary to be the deluge of water loose in the mine would be to pull a plug which was placed in the mines after the explosion of seven years ago, and the water would rush into the mines at a rate. Daily, one of the men known to be in the burning mine, went in for the first time yesterday morning, and it is not known who he is or where he is from. At 11 o'clock last night four men volunteered to go down shaft No. 2, and one man down No. 1, but up to this time it is not known whether they have succeeded in making any rescue. Gas and smoke are issuing from the mines, and over 200 men, women and children are waiting for some news of relatives. Doctors have been called and assistance is being offered on every side. Three Young Girls Drowned. Philadelphia, June 10.—A party of six persons—three men and three girls while rowing on the Delaware river yesterday afternoon off North Essington, a few miles below this city, were thrown into the water by the swamping of their skiff during a squall, and the three girls were drowned. The names of the girls are: Rosie Koons, aged 17 years; Mary Koons, 13; Maudie Trainer, 22. The party were guests of the Federal Boat club. Other members of the club heard the cries of the unfortunate and immediately set about rescuing them. The three men were quickly hauled into other boats, but the girls sank before they could be reached. Priest Murdered in a Church. City of Mexico June 11.—A clerical sensation has been caused at San Gerolimo, near the village of Otumba. It is alleged that a Spanish priest named Marcario had as a mistress a Senora Villa Vicencio. Transferring his affections to another woman, his mistress, it is said, became madly jealous and penetrating the church during the hour of confession shot the priest dead. This assassination within the precincts of the church is said to be unparalleled in the history of murders in this country. Five Killed in Collision and Explosion. Binghamton, N. Y., June 10.—While freight train No. 61 on the Lackawanna was taking water at Vestal, 10 miles west of here, Saturday night it was run into from behind by a double header wildcat freight. In the second car from the caboose of the stationary train was a large quantity of dynamite, which was exploded by the impact. Five men were killed, and seven others, all but two of them trainmen, were injured. Mrs. McKinley Steadily Improving.
