A JOINT RESOLUTION

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth in General Assembly met that the following is proposed as amendments to the Costitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof:

Amendment One to Article Eight, Section One.

Add at the end of the first paragraph of said section, after the words "shall be entitled to your at all elections," the words, "subject however to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact," so that the said section shall read as follows.

Section 1. Qualification of Electors, Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall oe entitled to yote at all elections, subject however to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact: may enact:

1. He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

2. He shall have resided in the State one year (or if, baving previously been a qualified elec-tor or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned within six months immediately preceding the elec-tion.)

3. He shall have resided in the election district 3. He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer his vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

4. If twenty-two years of age and upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election.


