## THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson in the International Series for October 29, 1901—Joseph Exalted.

[Prepared by H. C. Lenington.] THE LESSON TEXT.

(Genesis 41:38-43.)

38. And Pharaoh said unto his servants, Can we find such a one as this is, a man in whom the Spirit of God is?

39. And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, Forasmuch as God hath shewed thee all this, there is none so discreet and wise as thou art:

40. Thou shalt be over my house, and according unto thy word shall all my people be ruled: only in the throne will I be greater than thou.

41. And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, See, I have set thee over all the land of Egypt.

42. And Pharaoh took off his ring from his hand, and put it upon Joseph's hand, and arrayed him in vestures of fine linen, and put a gold chain about his neck.

43. And he made him to ride in his second chariot which he had; and they cried before him, Bow the knee: and he made him ruler over all the land of Egypt.

44. And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, I am Pharaoh, and without thee shall no man lift up his hand or foot in all the land of Egypt.

45. And Pharaoh called Joseph's name Zaphranth-paneach; and he gave him to wife Asenath the daughter of Poti-pherah, priest of On. And Joseph went out over all the land of Egypt.

46. And Joseph was 30 years old when he stood before Pharaoh, king of Egypt. And Joseph went out from the presence of Pharaoh, and went throughout all the land of Egypt.

47. And in the seven plentiful years the earth brought forth by handfuls.

48. And he gathered up all the food of the seven years, which were in the land of Egypt, and laid up the food in the cities: the food of the field, which was round about every city, laid he up in the same.

49. And Joshua gathered corn as the sand of the sea, very much, until he left numbering; for it was without number.

Golden Text.—Them that honor me I will honor.—1. Sam. 2:30.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

For this lesson we have the story of Joseph come to a position of authority in Egypt. It is related in Genesis 41. The following points are briefly noted:

Pharaoh's Two Dreams.—vs. 1-8. Pharaoh Hears of Joseph.—vs. 9-12. And Tells Him His Dreams.—vs. 13-15. Joseph's Interpretation.—vs. 16-22. His Wise Counsel.—vs. 23-26. Joseph Made Minister.—vs. 27-29. Has Two Sons.—vs. 30-32. The Famine Begins.—vs. 33-37.

Pharaoh's Two Dreams.—About two years after the remarkable dreams of the butler and the baker, which Joseph had so accurately interpreted, Pharaoh had a dream no less remarkable. It was of seven well-fed cows feeding in a meadow. Upon the heels of these came seven cows that were very lean, and which fell upon the fat ones and hungrily devoured them. Then Pharaoh awoke, but, falling asleep again, dreamed much the same thing, only instead of cows it was ears of corn. There were seven full ears closely followed by seven very poor ears, which quickly disposed of the ears that were full. The thing stuck in Pharaoh's mind and he could get no rest until a meaning had been given to his dreams. All the magicians were called in, but their replies were all unsatisfactory.

Pharaoh Hears of Joseph.—At this juncture Pharaoh's butler remembers that when in prison he had a dream and that a young Jewish prisoner had truly interpreted it for him. He remembers not only his own dream, but also the baker's dream and the baker's unhappy end, as foretold by Joseph. In Pharaoh's dilemma the butler tells of this wonderful prisoner.

Joseph Called to Court.—Pharaoh sends for Joseph, who shaves off the beard that has been growing while there in prison and makes himself otherwise as presentable as possible. Pharaoh greeted him as one that could "understand a dream to interpret it." Joseph showed his religion as well as his modesty by replying: "It is not in me; God shall give Pharaoh an answer of peace." There was a world of significance in that expression, "an answer of peace." Joseph knew what trouble was. He knew that "an answer of peace" was one of the greatest blessings Pharaoh could receive, yet he assured him God would give it.

Joseph's Interpretation.—When Joseph had heard Pharaoh's dreams he perceived that it was one dream twice repeated. The significance was the coming of seven years of plenty to be quickly followed by seven of dire famine.

His Wise Counsel.—Joseph was not a mere interpreter of dreams. If dreams to him were often messages from God, then they meant action for him, and he showed his practical wisdom by advising Pharaoh to prepare for the years of famine in the years of plenty.

Joseph in Prosperity.—Pharaoh discovered the wisdom of this advice. He saw, too, that a man through whom God could interpret dreams could also be trusted in a position of great responsibility. Thus it came that Joseph came to second in power in Egypt. It was during the seven years of plenty that Manasseh and Ephraim were born. No tribe of Israel was named after Joseph, but his two sons were remembered with all the other sons of Jacob.

Peloubet well says that "we should take great care to show that the wealth and power to which Joseph attained were not his success, but only certain outward signs of success, a portion of success which would not have been success, if alone. He could have attained the largest and best part of his success, even if he had remained a slave."
