RAILROAD DISASTER IN ALABAMA.

Excursion Train Jumped Track, Killing 30 and Injuring 81 Others.

Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 2.—While rounding a curve on a high embankment near Berry, Ala., yesterday morning the engine and four cars of an excursion train on the Southern Railway leaped from the track and rolled over and over down the incline, smashing the coaches into kindling wood and causing the instant death of 30 persons and the injury of 81 others. Physicians say that at least 20 of the injured cannot live.

With the exception of H. M. Dudley, trainmaster of the Southern Railway, living at Birmingham, and Roscoe Shelby, of Columbus, Miss., all of the dead and injured are negroes, who had taken advantage of excursion rates from points in Mississippi to Birmingham.

When the wreck occurred the train was running at the rate of 30 miles an hour, and had just started around a curve on top of a 60-foot embankment. Without warning the tender of the engine suddenly left the track, jolking the engine and the first four cars with it. The cars, which were packed with passengers, turned completely over several times and were crushed like eggshells, killing and crippling the inmates. The dead bodies of the negroes were scattered in every direction, and the monks and appeals for help from the wounded were heartrending.
