John E. Boyer and Dr. Valerchamp were local farmers who gave interesting and valuable talks on "Improving Farms," "Raising Small Fruits," and "Potato Culture."

Dr. Thayer gave valuable advice in his line of work, and surely all who listened to his lectures must have been greatly benefitted.

One of the most interesting features of the institute were the lectures by Mr. Brodhead, on the horse, with specimens. Mr. Brodhead undoubtedly understands horse shoeing, the care of the horse's teeth, etc. in every sense of the subject, and the audience only wished to hear more of his lectures.

Tuesday evening session was the Educational session. Prof. A. R. Gilbert delivered the address of welcome, which was responded to by Dr. I. A. Thayer. Prof. Walborn, R. S. Seeds, Dr. P. Herman and Edwin Charles made appropriate addresses.

Wednesday evening a session was held in the interests of Country Homes Architect John F. Stetler read a paper on "The Farmer's Home, considered from the Healthful and Convenient standpoints." The institute was entertained by Prof. Gilbert and pupils from the Middleburg High School.

The institute as a whole was interesting and many valuable hints and suggestions were thrown out for our farmers to try, and if found good to use and profit thereby.
