THE SOLDIERS' MONUMENT.

The petitions of a large number of citizens of Snyder county was presented to the Grand Jury Monday, to approve of the building of a Monument to the memory of the soldiers and sailors of Snyder county.

The architect's plans call for \$10,000; but, the grand jury cut the amount down to \$8,000.

Before this becomes effective, it must be approved by the Grand Jury next term and by the Court when the County Commissioners will be authorized to make the appropriation.

It is proposed that the tax to pay for this monument be extended at least over five years, more if desirable, so that it can be paid for without any one feeling it.

It is estimated that a tax payer without any property will pay about 10 cents.

The soldiers of Snyder county are justly entitled to this testimonial to their valor and self-denial and no one should object to contributing the small amount required from each one to erect a suitable memorial, for such a worthy cause.
