She was baptized and confirmed a member of the Reformed church on November 24th, 1855 by Rev. Wm. S. Sandow and she remained a true and loyal member of the same until her death.

She was married to George Hockenbrock on Thursday November 9, 1854 by Rev. Sandow.

She died on Wednesday Mar. 11, 1903, 1:30 a. m. at her residence about 3 miles south of Richfield in Juniata Co.

Her age was 74 years 2 months 12 days. Her husband was called home nearly 13 years ago.

Her Union with Mr. Hockenbrock was blessed with 5 children, 2 sons and 3 daughters. They are: Henry living at Ellensburg, Pa.; Edward a teacher living near Richfield; Alice, the wife of David Crater living near Richfield; Louise, wife of Henry Swartz living a few miles south of Richfield; Lillie wife of Seth Wiley of Swineford, also 2 brothers survive her: Daniel W. Snyder of Waterloo, Iowa; John W. Snyder of Niles, Michigan; Henry Snyder of Richfield, Pa. Besides 17 grand children many relatives and friends mourn her loss.

The funeral took place on Sunday, March 15, from her late residence. Rev. D. I. Schaeffer conducted the services. Interment in the Richfield Cemetery.

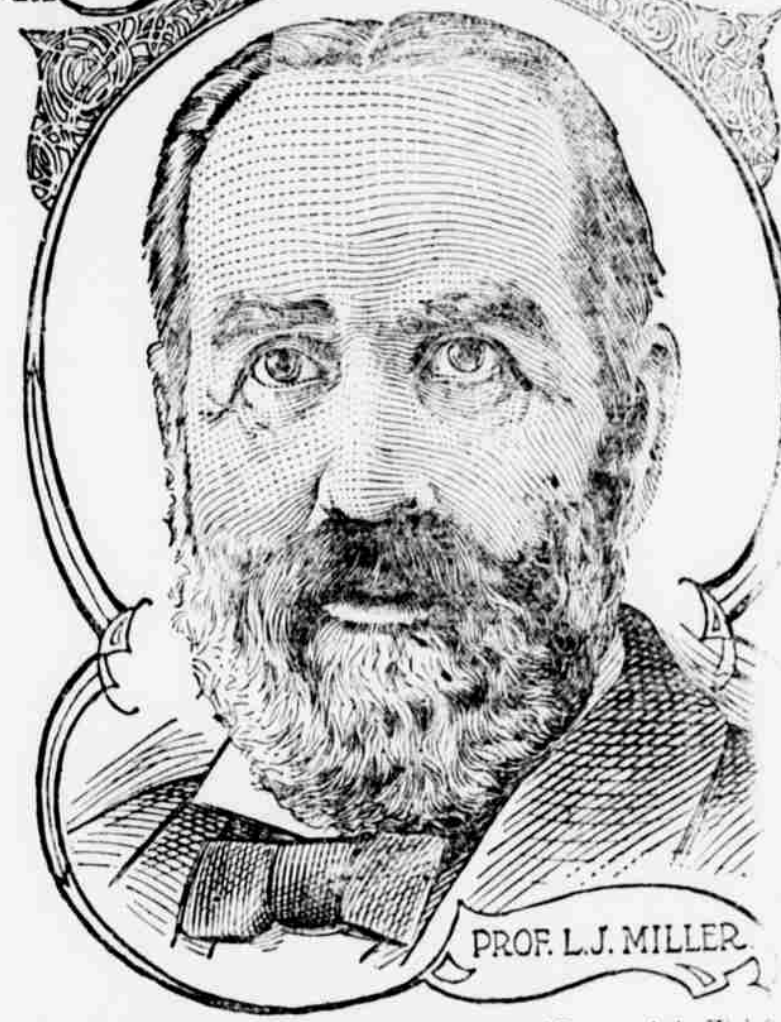
