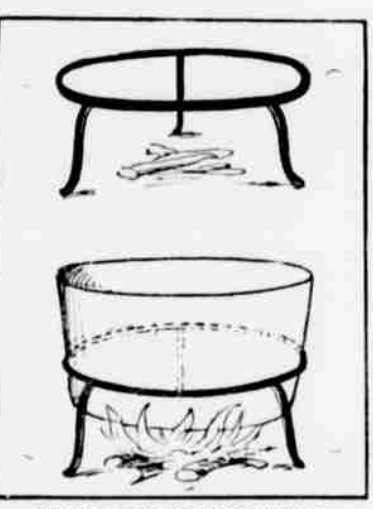

IRON KETTLE SUPPORT.

A Contrivance That Will Be Appreciated by Every Farmer at Butchering Time.

An article very handy to have in butchering time, a stand for the iron kettle used for heating water, is sketched by an Iowa Homestead correspondent.



Take a piece of wagon tire and bend it into a circle so that it will fit the kettle about half way up the side; then rivet or weld the ends together and fasten legs to this by rivets or welding. The legs should be so turned out at the bottom so they won't sink into the ground. The height of the leg should be about 12 inches.

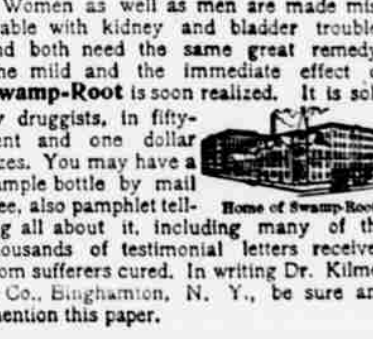
I prefer riveting, as it is so much easier done and can be done on the farm, while if the legs are welded on it will have to be made by a good blacksmith. With this device a person can heat water and render lard with the greatest convenience.

The Hatching of Ducklings.
When the eggs begin to hatch let them strictly alone. Do not try to turn the pipped sides up, and above do not open the machine every few hours to see how they are getting along, or show inquisitive friends how cunning the little dears look coming out of the shells. After the hatch is fairly over and the ducklings nearly or quite dried off, open the machine and quickly take out a tray and cover with a thin woolen cloth. Look the eggs over carefully, and if any are discovered cast in the shell or with head slightly caught break away enough of the shell to allow the little bird some freedom of movement and return the tray. Frequently these birds will break through and prove as lively as those earlier hatched.—Farm, Garden and Poultry.

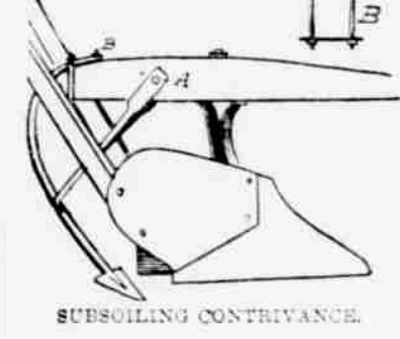
DESTROY THE WEEDS.

Concerted Action on the Part of the Farmers of Community is Always Effective.

The roads and railroads are great factors in weed distribution all over the country. The seeds of many plants are annually emptied upon our shores in the ballast left by sea vessels from foreign countries. Seeds also travel many miles and get locally distributed from the straw and chaff that is packed about shipments of goods. The worst distributors of bad weed seeds, however, are the neglected fence corners and overlooked roadside where the destructive plants are allowed to grow and give their seeds to the winds, scattering them for miles over field and farm. One thistle left to grow by the roadside will seed a territory for three and sometimes five miles round about it. Concerted action on the part of the farmers of a community is the best and surest method of getting rid of weeds, and the beginning of the year a good time to arrange plans for the campaign. In attempting to rid a field of weeds, those growing in the fence corners, by the roadside, along the banks of the ditches, and neglected places should not be forgotten. The work of destruction should be begun early in the year; that will make it easier. The work must be started early enough to kill the weeds before they begin to ripen. Cutting when in flower will destroy many weeds. Thistles, tarweed, and all members of the sunflower family, if cut while in bloom, will ripen and the seeds will mature. If cut at such times they should be piled and burned. Cultivation during the dry months of the summer is injurious to weeds and beneficial to crops, such as corn and potatoes. The only way to get rid of wild mustard in grain fields is to wait till the mustard blooms; at the time when the plants show up bright and yellow, go over the field and pull every one, piling and burning them. In addition to the above mentioned there are four bad weeds that are dreaded foes of the farmer and that are becoming all too numerous in every state. These are the French pink, dog fennel, white daisy and moth mullein. Some states have laws prohibiting the growing of any of these weeds on the farm, and in some states there are laws prohibiting one or more of them. But good laws are like good resolutions and good intentions, i. e., good for nothing unless put into operation. Intelligent and patient cooperation is of course the only law that is good for anything in this case. Something like the Salvation Army principle of work and the world works with you. But where the individual farmer has to work alone in this matter, the Epitomist can from experience recommend the Angora goat. He is a destroying and redeeming angel and little factory combined, for he removes the weeds and brush, opening up the land to tillage, and makes something out of nothing into Angora wens and money. plow, behind where the upright joins beam, at A, also have a fork made in the brace, so one hole through the beam will be sufficient. Then have a clamp made, B, with threads cut on each end so you can tighten; this clamp to be placed just in front of cross bar between handles. By using iron wedges you can set to any depth desired. Use a seven or eight inch shovel on this foot as you would on a common single stock.—W. T. Oliver, in Epitomist.

AGRICULTURAL NOTES.

The field work of the forestry bureau engages 162 scientific men in 42 states.

It has been demonstrated that alfalfa can be successfully grown in nearly all the northern states.

Government inspectors passed upon 59,158,649 live animals last year at a cost of a little more than one cent each.

Thousands of head of cattle are now saved from death from blackleg by a vaccine distributed by the government.

The percentage of loss in ocean transit of live stock in 1902 was: 0.13 for cattle, 0.89 for sheep, and 0.95 for horses, which was considerably less than for the previous year—a condition due to the increased exports of cattle and horses.

The agricultural department is now developing in the south a system of "one man farms." These are small areas of land in the pine woods, upon which a system of farming is being developed of such a nature as to appeal directly to the class of farmers who must necessarily handle such land.
