

The Hatching of Ducklings.

When the eggs begin to hatch let them strictly alone. Do not try to turn the pipped sides up, and above do not open the machine every few hours to see how they are getting along, or show inquisitive friends how cunning the little dears look coming out of the shells. After the hatch is fairly over and the ducklings nearly or quite dried off, open the machine and quickly take out a tray and cover with a thin woolen cloth Look the eggs over carefully, and if any are discovered cast in the shell or with head slightly caught break away enough of the shell to allow the little bird some freedom of movement and return the tray. 
