The business for 1902 on the New York stock exchange, though less than for 1901, was still such as to indicate abnormal activity. In 1901 247,000,000 shares were sold; last year 173,000,000. Of 29 active stocks 96,000,000 shares were sold. In Union Pacific alone 16,500,000 shares changed hands; the entire capital of the road was sold five times over in New York alone! The par value of stock sold came to the total of \$17,500,000,000. This is four billions greater than the combined revenue and expenditure of the civilized nations of the earth; it is eight times the value of our foreign commerce. So, allowing for all of what may be called legitimate investment, it would seem that there had been a vast amount of speculation.

The insolvency of half a dozen get-rich-quick companies in St. Louis, with branches in all the large cities, proves that people will never learn that five per cent. a month cannot be realized in any legitimate business. States are very careful about bogus insurance companies; why should they not have, asks the Indianapolis Journal, some law requiring an investigation of all companies that are organized on the get-rich-quick basis?

The St. Louis Medical society is about to give a banquet in honor of three physicians of that city who have practiced medicine 63 years or more, at least 50 years of the time having been spent in St. Louis. The physicians thus to be honored are Drs. Simon Pollok, who has practiced 65 years; William Johnston, who has practiced 63 years, and William McPheters, who has practiced 63 years.

That the American family is becoming a back number and that American women prefer pets to children is declared by Dr. George F. Shrady, editor of the Medical Record. Dr. Shrady became famous as Gen. U. S. Grant's personal physician, and his observations have been made in a large measure among the "smart set" in New York. He recently wrote an article for the Medical Record, in which he printed statistics showing how families are decreasing. Taking these official figures as the basis of his argument, Dr. Shrady goes on to declare that the birth rate in the United States, especially among the well-to-do, is rapidly getting as low as it is in France, where general alarm has been caused for the future of the country. Life in flats and the demands of society are given as the principal causes why the American-born woman dislikes to raise a family. In discussing the subject, Dr. Shrady said: "The fashionable woman of to-day does not want children. If she bears them she does not rear them properly, and they become sickly and die. This aversion to children is rapidly spreading through all classes of society is generally recognized by the medical profession. It is true among the well-to-do everywhere, in the country as well as in cities. We are following rapidly in the path of France, where the subject has occupied the attention of statesmen and lawmakers for years, and prizes are offered by the government for large families. In this country, however, our Anglo-Saxon prudery will always stand in the way of any general campaign on this subject. Physicians can do something in the way of educating their own patients, but their efforts in the aggregate amount to but little. The demands of society and the life of our people in flats, where the baby is more unwelcome than a dog, are among the factors responsible for this state of affairs, and I see no hope for the future."
