The Proposed Monument.

The grand jury of June Court will be called upon to pass judgment on the question of approving an appropriation of \$8,000 for the erection of a suitable memorial in behalf of the valor of the Soldiers and Sailors who went from Snyder county in any of the wars in behalf of this country.

The above is an illustration of the proposed monument. It is estimated that it will cost about \$20,000, but the Grand Jury in February did not approve more than \$8,000. According to the Act of Assembly this amount must be approved by another grand jury and by the Court, before the County Commissioners are authorized to erect the monument.

The attention of this Grand Jury is directed to the unusual privations endured by the soldiers on duty. This was true more especially during the Civil War and since Snyder county had so many soldiers in this great conflict, it is just and fitting that their valor be commemorated by erecting a suitable memento.
