The Teacher's Qualifications.

Editor Post:—

This subject speaks volumes to the intelli-

gent mind, and is entirely too lengthy for a newspaper article. I will therefore not burden you nor your readers, but will briefly set forth the qualifications of the ideal teacher.

But to obtain that knowledge it requires thinking, and the bookworm teacher can teach no one to think. Thought begets thought. A teacher must be competent to generalize formulas in all branches and to simplify all work whenever necessary for the benefit of his pupils. If with the proper knowledge of the branches to be taught, he is qualified to do this work, he will pass as a teacher but not yet as an ideal teacher. In addition to all this knowledge one must possess qualities that bespeak success in order to be or to become an ideal teacher. First and above all qualities, is character. Next comes sobriety, decency, honesty, kindness, politeness, truthfulness, respect, love for the work and sociability. When one possesses all these qualities in addition to knowing what to teach and how to teach there is no doubt of success. The ideal teachers are scarce and the writer knows not one in Snyder and all surrounding counties.

No Liquor for Habitual Drunkards.
Charles H. Pennypacker, Chief Burgess of West Chester, proposes to stop the sale of liquor to habitual drunkards in his town. He compiled a list of more than 100 persons and filed a copy of the same with each of the 18 landlords. The liquor dealers have been notified not to sell liquor to any persons whose names appear on the list. We wonder how such a plan would work in Middleburg, and whose names would be on the list if made out by the Chief Burgess.

Cheaper Telephone Rates.

If competition would reduce the rates sufficiently to get a large number of additional subscribers, the advantage to all persons concerned would be self-evident. Until that is done, let us hope for the best.
