Pennsylvania Editors Take Action on Press Muzzler. At the annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Editorial Association at Atlantic City recently the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That earnest effort to secure the repeal of said Grady-Salus libel law by the next legislature be made by a committee of this association acting alone or in conjunction with similar committees of other organizations.

Resolved, That the expense involved in defending actions brought under said law and in securing its repeal be provided for by a fund created for these purposes.

Resolved, by the Pennsylvania State Editorial Association in convention assembled: That the newspapers of the state should join in defense of any paper made defendant in action brought through opportunities created by the Grady-Salus libel law and contest such action to the court of last resort in order conclusively to test the constitutionality of said law.

Resolved, That earnest effort to secure the repeal of said Grady-Salus libel law by the next legislature be made by a committee of this association acting alone or in conjunction with similar committees of other organizations.

Resolved, That the expense involved in defending actions brought under said law and in securing its repeal be provided for by a fund created for these purposes.
