

WARRANT FOR BEAVERS

Postal Official Indicted on Charge of Bribery.

INDICATED CANNOT BE FOUND

Postal Official Charged at Publicity of Matter Before Warrant is Served and Refuses to Make a Statement at this Time.

New York, July 18.—A bench warrant has been issued by Judge Thomas of the United States Circuit Court, Brooklyn, for the arrest of George W. Beavers formerly chief of the division of salaries and allowances in the postoffice department, on an indictment found by the federal grand jury which charges him with accepting a bribe of \$340. It is understood that payments to Beavers were traced back to the purchase by the government of a Brandt-Dent Cash Registering Machine Co. The postoffice inspectors and other Beavers had a large amount in Nassau Trust Company, Brooklyn, and are said to have diversified their checks deposited there.

Result of Long Investigation.

Washington, July 18.—The issuance of a bench warrant for the arrest of George W. Beavers, the former chief of the division of salaries and allowances in the postoffice department, is the culmination of an investigation that has been in progress at intervals for his sudden resignation from office last spring. A number of letters affecting his administration have been probed into, one of the first of which was the cancellation of 2048 promotions that had been issued by him, to take effect at offices throughout the country during the present fiscal year. The authorities are now searching for Mr. Beavers to place him under arrest. The postal officials were charged to learn of the publicity of the son of the grand jury in advance of serving the warrant. They read the news as premature and declined to discuss the matter, on the ground that the time was not yet ripe to make a statement.

BRUCE BATTLE IN VENEZUELA

General Bolivar Taken by Government Forces After Terrible Fight. Ciudad, Venezuela, July 11.—The agreement between the government and the revolutionists occupying Ciudad Bolivar began in two different directions. The revolutionists and the battle. The smoke over Ciudad Bolivar was so thick that it was impossible to see the city. The government troops, after a terrible fight, which they lost more than 100 men, captured the cemetery. Later the Venezuelan fleet, consisting of five men-of-war, shelled the government buildings at Ciudad Bolivar. At 10 o'clock revolutionists' flag had disappeared from the government building, and at all the streets near that building were captured by the government forces, and a charge of all the government soldiers in the city was ordered. The wounded were then beginning to arrive at the government headquarters from all directions, and the fight was general; but the movements could not be followed from here in consequence of the smoke caused by the fire of the artillery of the revolutionists, which seemed formidable. It was anticipated vigorously by the government forces, and only a few shots reached the city.

PANIC ON RIVER STEAMER

Boating Log Disables the Thomas Clyde on the Delaware. Chester, Pa., July 20.—Nearly 1,000 persons from Philadelphia, this city county were thrown into a panic on the excursion steamboat Thomas Clyde on the Delaware. On the way down the Delaware from Philadelphia to Woodland the boat stopped at this city and a party of excursionists from the Eddy Sunday school, the Clifton High Band, the Addingham Club and Fifth Ward Social Club, the latter about two miles below Pennsgrove, Pa., a floating log became fastened to one of the steamboat's side paddle wheels, disabling the boat. The crushing grinding noise caused by the log driving around the wheel, breaking paddles, frightened the women and children. Some one started an alarm and the boat was sinking. Women and children screamed, while men hurriedly secured life preservers which were quickly placed about women and the little ones.
