depth varying at other points, three

Camp Closed.
The first meeting of the Centreville
Rod and Gun Club for the season of
1908, closed last Wednesday after a
very enjoyable time at the Rock
Springs, of as the place has been called
for years, at the "Fox Head," Helen
Kupf. This is a short bluff of large
rocks along the public road leading
from Centreville to Hartleton in Union
county, about one mile west of Cen-
treville bridge. The camp was located
directly across Samsel's farm at one
of the coldest springs of water that
can be found from the Susquehanna to
Rising Springs. The ground is cov-
ered with large young hemlock, gum
and other trees that do not let the sun
on the camping spot until about an
hour before sets. Dr. J. W. Samsel
is the owner of the ground and is
cutting the timber from this tract, but
has decided not to cut any part of it
that is on the camping ground and
will make it permanent by erecting
buildings necessary for the comfort of
those who desire to spend a week or
so there at any time, for which he ex-
pects to charge a nominal rental to
bear some of his expenses. He erected
one building last week and hopes to
have two or three more finished very
shortly. This spot is right in the heart
of the fishing ground. The water
having washed the stream over two
miles and found its line at every point.
All rock bottom.
Bass seem to be scarce this year, but
owing to the water being very clear it
is hard to tell if they are plentiful
or not, as they could see a fisherman
for fifty yards. The writer came to
the conclusion from his observations,
that there are two reasons why more
bass are generally caught at Samsel's
dam than can be caught at the dam
close to town here. First, the bottom
almost the whole length of the dam
and for miles above and below is almost
covered with various sized rocks, a
second reason is as follows:
Second, minnows and other bait are
very scarce. Not more than a dozen
can be seen at one time and these only
in a few favorable spots, without these
dam thousands of minnows and family
heads can be seen all the time, and not
a rock to be found in the main part of it.
The party consisted of J. H. Hart-
man, President of the Club, who was
the constant officer of the day and di-
rected the fishing; H. P. Grimm, sec-
retary of the club who is always bent
hook assisted by H. N. Ritter, who
though unable to walk by reason of his
lower limbs being paralyzed from a
fall from a bridge), is the strongest
man otherwise in the party, being able
to push a boat a whole lake with a good
load on, without fatigue.
Dr. J. W. Samsel takes care of the
physical part of the crowd. E. Bal-
ender's part was to put away as many of
the refreshments as possible, while
Danny Bingham and J. E. Slaughter
attended to that part that is absolutely
essential in preventing fatigue. Foster
Spangler was always on hand with the
team and kept up the commissary.
Sheriff Samsel forwarded three mes-
sengers and favoured a lot of turtle soup,
etc., while a number of boys on the fire
wood carried the messages and mail to
and from town. It was a week of great
enjoyment and camp was only broken
as early as it was by reason of the
water being too clear to fish. Plenty
of fish were caught to supply the needs
daily and for the families of the party.
Another party will be made later in the
season.
